
# **West Highlands**

Western Highlands accessible from, and south of, Glenfinnan (Road to the Isles) and Glen Spean (includes Creag Meagaidh). This area includes Ben Nevis and the mountains around Glencoe. In the east, from Ben Alder south to Loch Lomond and Trossachs NP. Also Arran and Mull.



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# General Summary for Wednesday, 1 May, 2024



# British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 1 May, 2024

East to southeast winds, mostly moderate in strength, will bring low cloud to eastern hills, but breaking up widely in the west with patchy sun. The legacy of a front will act as a focus for scattered heavy shower development, whilst an area of rain may spread in across parts of the east and Wales later in the day.

# **Headline for West Highlands**

Risk of heavy showers breaking out. Hills generally mostly clear. Patchy sun.

# Detailed Forecast for Wednesday, 1 May, 2024

How windy? (On the Munros)	East to southeasterly between 10 and 20mph: generally strongest in the morning and toward Arran.	
Effect of wind on you?	Blustery at times in the morning.	
How wet?	A little rain here and there. Risk heavier showers afternoon.	
(Precipitation and its impact)	Rain and drizzle on and off before dawn will continue into the day in some areas, but through morning nearly all fizzle out. Scattered heavier showers afternoon.	
Cloud on the hills?	All or nearly all clearing	
	Extensive cloud across the hills from dawn: very varied cloud base, in places (most likely Arran and Loch Lomond NP) covering lowest slopes.  Slowly the cloud will break up; by mid afternoon, nearly all summits cloud free.	
Chance of cloud free Munros?	20% rising to 80%	
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Cloud layers gradually thinning and breaking to give a patchwork of sun; sunniest toward the coast. Excellent visibility.	
How Cold? (at 900m)	6C rising toward 10C	
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

Effect of wind on you?	Locally very varied, but expect sudden buffeting making walking arduous in places not just on higher terrain.	Be prepared for very blustery conditions at times with marked wind chill and buffeting.
How wet?	Rain unlikely	Risk of scattered heavy showers
(Precipitation and its impact)	Most likely dry, small chance a shower.	Uncertainty: May well be dry most of the day, or in the west all of the day. Risk of a few heavy showers breaking out.
Cloud on the hills?	Little if any	Hills may be mostly clear. A few cloud banks.
	Banks of cloud clinging to some slopes at times, greatest risk around Loch Lomond NP, but many areas largely clear all day.	Hills may well be mostly clear, or in the west, completely clear through the day. Some cloud banks, mostly in the east, and also in and around showers elsewhere.

Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Sun and thin high cloud. Very good visibility, but slight haze toward central belt.	Cloud layers thinning to reveal sunshine, most widely near west coast. Visibility very good.
How Cold? (at 900m)	8C to locally above 10C. Feeling close to freezing directly in wind.	8 to 10C

# **Planning Outlook**

# All mountain areas of Britain from Thursday, 2 May, 2024

High pressure to the north and a slow-moving area of low pressure circulating to the south during midweek. Scattered showers possible for the Highlands, but a lot of dry weather - warmest and clearest in the west. Powerful easterly winds will be very gusty by Thursday into early Friday, especially Scotland and northern England, then easing. A front brings a risk of persistent rain for Wales on Thursday. Slow-moving weather patterns are likely to continue onward into the Bank Holiday weekend, giving considerable uncertainty of local day-to-day detail, but most likely the wind often light and fairly warm overall. A good amount of dry and bright weather, but risk of locally thundery showers forming.
