




The southernmost Pennines, covering the entire Peak District National Park, also extending north to hills accessed from Hebden Bridge, and including the hills immediately north of Manchester.

General Summary for Tuesday, 19 March, 2024



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 19 March, 2024

Upland gales for the Highlands in the morning will ease. Early heavy bursts of rain clearing eastwards to leave often drier conditions. Variable cloud amounts, most persistent over western mountains, but lifting with some breaks forming.

Headline for Peak District

Strong winds easing. Isolated showers.

Detailed Forecast for Tuesday, 19 March, 2024

How windy? (On the summits)	Southwesterly 25mph, easing to westerly 15mph in afternoon.	
Effect of wind on you?	Blustery morning with some buffeting at times, but easing down in the afternoon.	
How wet?	Occasional showers	
(Precipitation and its impact)	A few drizzly showers through the day, but in the morning these perhaps heavier for a time.	
Cloud on the hills?	Cloud lifting off the tops	
	Fairly extensive hill fog from dawn across upper slopes. However, through morning the bases will steadily rise, to likely lift off the tops by the middle of the day.	
Chance of cloud free summits?	30% lifting to 80%	
Sunshine?	Cloudy morning, sunny periods in the afternoon.	
Air clarity (below cloud)	Visibility poor at times in morning drizzly showers, but otherwise very good.	
Temperature (at	6C.	
600m)	Wind chill feeling like -2C in stronger winds.

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Peak District - Looking Ahead

	Wednesday 20 March	Thursday 21 March
How windy? (On the summits)	Northwesterly or variable 10mph or at times less.	West to southwesterly 25 to 35mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Mostly small	Blustery over the hills, affecting comfortable walking. Considerable wind chill.
How wet?	Damp day with rain on and off.	Rain developing
(Precipitation and its impact)	A damp day with light to at times moderate rain, which will continue on and off through the day, easing later in the afternoon.	Rain arriving in from the west, becoming steadier as the day progresses, wettest over western hills.
Cloud on the hills?	Mostly fairly extensive	Risk lowering cloud
	Hill fog is likely to be fairly extensive through the day as the rain stays fairly persistent. Some local breaks, mainly later in the day.	Much cloud likely above the hills for a time, but banks likely to form during day.
Chance of cloud free summits?	20%	60%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Overcast. Visibility poor due to rain, may improve.	Increasingly cloudy. Visibility good, but becoming hazier.
Temperature (at 600m)	Around 3C	6 to 8C. Wind chill feeling below freezing on tops.
And in the valleys	7 to 9C	5C rising to 11C.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 20 March, 2024

Mixed westerly patterns prevail this week, but turning northwesterly toward the weekend allowing much colder air to move in - dropping extensively below freezing point over all British mountains for several days. Fresh upland snowfalls, concentrated toward the west and north of the Highlands, including heavy showers with hail.

A period of sustained gales over the tops late this week and likely into the weekend - severe gales over Scottish tops on Thursday at least; significant or at times severe wind chill factor.
