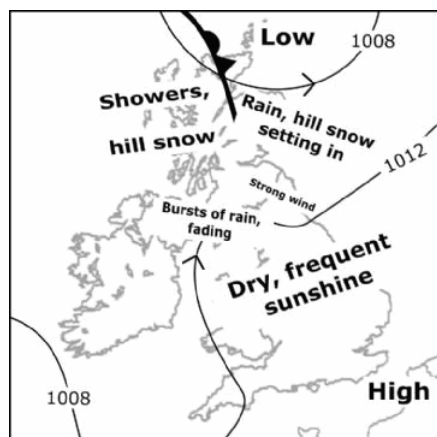

General Summary for Thursday, 17 April, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 17 April, 2025

Snow setting in for a time over the Munros in Scotland, staying sub-zero on high tops. Showery in the Southern Uplands. Windy with bursts of rain in north England, fading through afternoon as cloud lifts and breaks. Mostly dry with a brisk breeze south Pennines and Wales with frequent sunshine.

Headline for Brecon Beacons

Frequent sun, some patchy cloud building later.

Detailed Forecast for Thursday, 17 April, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Southwesterly at dawn soon shifting southerly, 10-15mph. Slight increase in speed around dusk to 20mph in places.
Effect of wind on you?	Mostly small
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	A few patchy showers after noon Mostly dry during the day. A few patches of light showery rain drifting in from the south in the afternoon.
Cloud on the hills?	Mostly clear, patchy over high terrain later Hills mostly clear through much of daylight, only a few passing cloud caps over highest tops will come and go. Increasing frequency in the later afternoon with some bases dropping near 700m.
Chance of cloud free summits?	80%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Frequently sunny for much of the day, patchy cloud building in through the afternoon and perhaps overcast around dusk. Excellent visibility.
How Cold? (at 750m)	4 or 5C, rising slightly
Freezing Level	Above the summits

All mountain areas of Britain from Friday, 18 April, 2025

Several cores of low pressure are circulating around the British Isles through the weekend and into next week. Western areas are likely to see rain with a few stray showers into the east. High pressure will briefly build in on Easter, settling the weather momentarily. Southern areas will see showers into early next week and low pressure will become dominant in the Atlantic, which may push several bands of rain eastward toward the British Isles, though details remain uncertain at this point. Temperatures will be near average or slightly cooler, depending on the position of low pressure.

Forecasts are issued daily by 16:30 and are kept under review and amended as necessary. However, expected conditions can still change after issue. © Copyright Mountain Weather Information Service, 2025.
