

Brecon Beacons

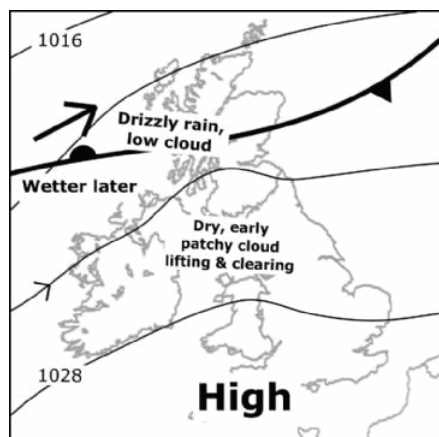
Includes all higher summits in the southern half of Wales: the Bannau Brycheiniog / Brecon Beacons National Park, southern Cambrian Mountains and highest Preseli hills.



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General Summary for Monday, 16 June, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 16 June, 2025

A front draped over the Highlands brings low cloud and drizzly rain to western areas, heavier rain pushing northwards in the afternoon. Southwesterly winds will strengthen later in Scotland, becoming gales on higher mountains by evening. Dry with sunny spells and cloud clearing the tops in England & Wales.

Headline for Brecon Beacons

Light-moderate breeze. Low cloud in morning, clearing most hills.

Detailed Forecast for Monday, 16 June, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	West then southwesterly, 15 to 20mph, tending to increase a little evening into night.
Effect of wind on you?	Small most of day.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain unlikely Possibly pockets of fine drizzle slopes close to southwest facing coasts.
Cloud on the hills?	Low cloud gradually breaking up Cloud banks above 500-600m in the morning, or to some lower elevations southern slopes toward south & west of Brecon; highest tops may be near top of fog layer. Into middle of day, tending to lift, thin and disperse, though patches may linger across west Wales.
Chance of cloud free summits?	20% rising to 60% west, 80% east.
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Fairly cloudy in morning, misty over many slopes S/W; some sun eastern mid-Wales. Improving to a patchwork of cloud and sun, very good visibility, some mist may linger west coast.
How Cold? (at 750m)	11C rising to 14C, local 16C east Wales afternoon.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

How windy? (On the summits)	West to southwesterly 15 to 20mph.	Westerly or variable 10mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Mostly small.	Small
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Little or no rain Patchy drizzly rain may move onto western Cambrians for a time into afternoon, brief spots possible elsewhere, otherwise likely staying dry.	Rain not expected
Cloud on the hills?	Low cloud most persistent western hills Varied low cloud banks above 500-600m, most frequent west Wales, may be more constant on some windward slopes. Cloud more broken and bases rising further eastwards.	Possible patchy cloud or coastal fog Patchy cloud banks drifting onto some coastal slopes, may be fog on lower slopes for a time. Tending to all thin and disperse though a chance of fog lingering right along the Cardigan Bay coastline.
Chance of cloud free summits?	50%	80%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Glimpses of sun mostly east, cloudier western mid-Wales. Visibility good out of cloud, may be hazier west.	Mostly sunny, some fair-weather cloud. Visibility very good, but possibly misty near to the sea.
How Cold? (at 750m)	11C, quite humid.	11C rising to 16C.
Freezing Level	Above the summits	Above the summits

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 17 June, 2025**

Humid southwesterly winds early this week brings low cloud and spells of drizzly rain to western hills. High pressure to the south will tend to expand northwards during midweek, with dry conditions and warm air for all regions, sunshine and fair-weather cloud. Winds becoming light south to southeasterlies later in the week. Uncertainty by next weekend into early the following week, a risk of some rain or showers returning as pressure tends to fall.
