

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General Summary for Tuesday, 24 June, 2025



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 24 June, 2025

Frequent rain/drizzle onto most west coastal slopes, steadier rain for a time in the morning slipping east. High terrain mostly foggy, down to lower slopes in places along west coasts; best of breaks east Scotland and North Pennines. Blustery for most with risk of gales high terrain of England and north Wales.

Headline for Brecon Beacons

Blustery and foggy; drizzle on western slopes, extended rain early

Detailed Forecast for Tuesday, 24 June, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	West to southwesterly 25 to 35mph.	
Effect of wind on you?	Blustery, frequent buffeting will challenge stability in places on higher exposed terrain. Marked wind chill.	
How wet?	Drizzly rain western slopes; briefly more extensive rain early.	
(Precipitation and its impact)	Generally damp with drizzly rain most frequent on western hills; little toward east and north slopes. Steadier rain for a time across most areas in the morning, some heavy moments on southern slopes.	
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive	
	Shrouding the mountains from mid-to-lower slopes upward toward south and west of Brecon. Highest bases eastward around Black Mountains, 500-600m.	
Chance of cloud free summits?	10%	
Sunshine?	Largely cloudy, little or no sun.	
Air clarity (below cloud)	Rather misty across hills, locally good visibility below cloud east Wales.	
How Cold? (at 750m)	12 or 13C, little if any change all day. Feeling like 3C in the wind.

How windy? (On the summits)	Westerly, shifting southwesterly, 20 to 25mph. Stronger gusts at times western areas especially later in the day.	Westerly 25-35mph. Shifting southwesterly into evening and rising to 45mph+.
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small, may start to feel noticeable and affect balance where exposed.	Walking impeded in strongest winds, becoming arduous into evening. Marked wind chill.
How wet?	Drizzly rain, risk wetter later	Rain early morning, then substantially dry
(Precipitation and its impact)	Frequently drizzly west and south, drier toward eastern mid-Wales. Risk of steadier rain arriving later afternoon with local heavy bursts on southern slopes.	Soon dry after early morning rain. Small chance of isolated spots of light rain as the day goes.
Cloud on the hills?	Lowest and most persistent southwest	Extensive early, clearing summits
	Covering hills west and south of Brecon perhaps most of the day, to mid-slopes for periods at least, especially in rain. Higher cloud bases further east and into mid-Wales, some breaks to higher tops.	Quite extensive at dawn, down to lowest slopes in the west. Lifting and breaking through morning for cloud-free summits. Westernmost areas may see passing cloud banks here and there. Risk of more extensive cloud reforming on high terrain into evening.
Chance of cloud free summits?	30%	Becoming above 90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Largely cloudy, glimpses of sun east. Visibility very good out of cloud.	Sun gradually becoming frequent through morning. Excellent visibility.
How Cold? (at 750m)	12C much of the day. Eastern hills may rise towards 14C afternoon. Feeling like 5C in the wind.	11 or 12C in the morning. Cooling to 9C around midday/afternoon. Feeling at or below freezing in wind.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 25 June, 2025

West to southwesterly winds prevail this week and a series of frontal systems come in from the Atlantic. Rain and drizzle most frequent in west with low cloud often covering hills, typically most extensive in Scotland. Higher cloud bases and drier further eastwards. Temperatures near average, or lower at times in Scotland. Often windy, risk of more extensive upland gales and some heavier rain as deeper areas of low pressure likely move in later in the week. Some indication of a brief settled spell into the weekend and rising temperatures, though northwest Scotland remaining at risk of frontal weather systems.
