

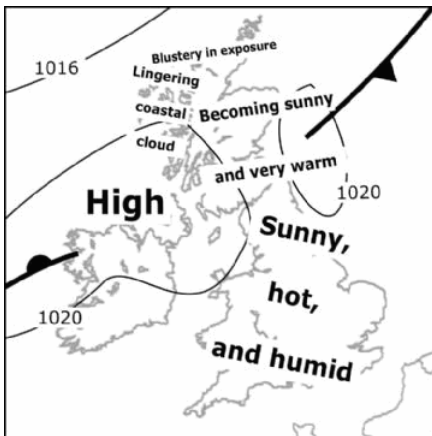
Brecon Beacons

Includes all higher summits in the southern half of Wales: the Bannau Brycheiniog / Brecon Beacons National Park, southern Cambrian Mountains and highest Preseli hills.



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General Summary for Wednesday, 24 June, 2026



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 24 June, 2026

Extensive hot sunshine and unusually humid - beware sunburn and dehydration. England and Wales as well as east Scotland see early low patchy fog clearing; highest tops of east Scotland may be at or above the cloud layer at dawn. Some cloud clings to Scotland's west coast, breezy over far northern tops.

Headline for Brecon Beacons

Exceptionally hot and humid sunshine; some haze

Detailed Forecast for Wednesday, 24 June, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	Variable 10mph or less most of the day. Later, trending east-southeasterly strengthening towards 10-15mph into/overnight.
Effect of wind on you?	Negligible
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	No rain
Cloud on the hills?	Little if any Some early fog patches in the valleys, an odd bank higher up, these lifting after dawn and soon dissipating for cloud-free hills.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Above 90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Extensive sunshine. May be quite hazy, though some improvement from the north.
How Cold? (at 750m)	22C rising toward an exceptionally hot and humid 25 to perhaps 27C.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

Brecon Beacons - Looking Ahead

	Thursday 25 June	Friday 26 June
How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	South to southeasterly between 15 and 25mph; perhaps gusty at times, risk stronger western hills, to 35mph. Fairly small, although there may be sudden buffeting at times both on higher areas and some lower slopes.	South-southwesterly 15-25mph; risk stronger early with strong gusts around showers. Fairly small, but notably breezy in the morning with early buffeting gusts starting to affect stability.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Small risk thunderstorms Risk thunderstorms developing later afternoon giving locally torrential rain.	Risk early rain/thunderstorms From before dawn, risk scattered bursts of heavy rain or thunderstorms. These likely drift north, and later afternoon may be largely dry.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Little if any although patches may form near rain Some patchy fog just at dawn, soon dissipating and extensively cloud free. Should thunderstorms occur, varied ragged patches reforming. 90%	May shroud high terrain much of the day Other than some early ragged patchy cloud, the hills will be largely clear at dawn. Banks of cloud begin forming on upper slopes through morning, the lowest banks to 500m southern slopes for several hours, breaking somewhat later. 40%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Periods of sunshine. Persistent haze.	Some sun through high cloud, probably more overcast for a period. Visibility improves after morning haze lifts.
How Cold? (at 750m) Freezing Level	Exceptionally warm 25 to 29C in afternoon, humid. Valley temperatures locally approaching 32 to 34C. Above the summits.	Starting near a hot and humid 21 to 23C, cooling to 17 to 19C with time, coolest west (perhaps 16C Preseli hills). Above the summits.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Thursday, 25 June, 2026**

Exceptionally warm and humid most mountain areas until later Friday; valley temperatures approaching the low-to-middle 30s in England and Wales, with hill temperatures approaching the high 20s at least. Scotland will be slightly cooler, though temperatures will still reach the low 20s on many slopes.

Scattered thunderstorms on Thursday and Friday, with a risk of extended torrential thunderstorms on Friday afternoon in northern areas. Over the weekend, progressively less warm as fronts begin to come in off the Atlantic, bringing a strengthening wind and bands of rain and low cloud, particularly affecting western mountains. Into the following week, Atlantic westerlies will dominate, with an indication of high pressure to the south producing dry and bright windows.
