

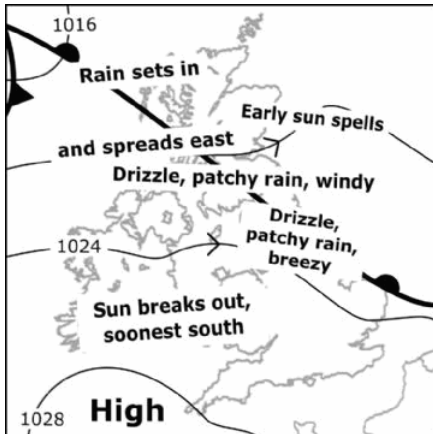
Brecon Beacons

Includes all higher summits in the southern half of Wales: the Bannau Brycheiniog / Brecon Beacons National Park, southern Cambrian Mountains and highest Preseli hills.



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General Summary for Sunday, 5 July, 2026



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 5 July, 2026

Early sunny bursts in east Scotland, rain and cloud setting in west and spreading widely with time. Extensive cloud and drizzle on English summits, some patchy rain, notably northwest hill groups; south Pennines drier later. Largely dry Wales, sun increasingly breaking out (through high cloud), particularly south.

Headline for Brecon Beacons

Early hill cloud largely clears; very warm sunshine

Detailed Forecast for Sunday, 5 July, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	Westerly 15-20mph, notable gustiness on higher terrain; trending towards lower speeds for several afternoon hours.
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small but some nuisance gusts on high terrain.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	No rain expected
Cloud on the hills?	Early patchy cloud dissipates Variable ribbons of cloud in the morning, most extensive banks on coastal Cambrian slopes. East hills may be largely clear, any patches of cloud not necessarily over highest terrain. A lifting trend and breaking up, only a small chance of passing patches on high slopes afternoon.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Rising to 90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Patchy sunshine in the morning gradually becomes extensive, though weakened by high cloud. Very good visibility.
How Cold? (at 750m)	12C rising to 16C, or locally a degree warmer easternmost hills.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Westerly 15-20mph, notable gustiness on higher terrain, to 25mph or briefly stronger. Fairly small but nuisance gusts on high terrain.	Northwesterly 15-25mph, a slight easing trend with time, but very gusty all day, not just over high tops. Ease of walking affected due to gusts over high terrain and downslope to the east, trending towards fairly small effects.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Any rain unlikely Some fine drizzle in early morning cloud possible, but soon entirely dry.	No rain expected
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Varied banks upper terrain Variable banks of cloud above the middle slopes in the morning, most extensive towards Cambrians. Summits may be between/above cloud layers. A lifting trend and largely breaking for clear hills, though variable banks drifting over high summits from time to time. 70%	Early varied cloud largely clears Varied banks of cloud in the morning in several layer, high tops near or above cloud layers. Banks lift somewhat through morning but will largely dissipate with time, largely clear afternoon. Rising to 90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Regular bursts of sunshine, more extensive later, but weakened by high cloud. Very good visibility.	Glimpses of early sun, becoming extensive with time. Very good visibility.
How Cold? (at 750m) Freezing Level	11 or 12C, rising to 15 or 17C, coolest north and west of high tops; may approach 18C southeasternmost hills. Above the summits.	13 to 15C, rising to 17C, little change with added, height, tops start warmer. Above the summits.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Monday, 6 July, 2026**

Rain, drizzle and low cloud persist over western hills from Lake District northward into early next week. Temperatures near average, but feeling cool in exposure to wind on tops, quite strong and gusty central and south Scotland. Northeast areas are drier with higher cloud bases but rain reaches here too. Higher pressure south maintains drier conditions in Wales and the south Pennines but cloud and some drizzle will affect high western slopes from time to time; lighter wind here, but nuisance gusts in exposure. A drier and warmer window builds into the middle of next week: very warm in England and Wales, spells of sunshine spread northward, and lighter wind. Some showers and patchy rain continue through late week and next weekend, though detail is uncertain and more often dry.
