

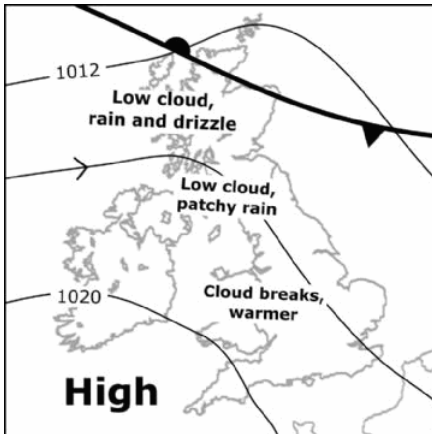
Brecon Beacons

Includes all higher summits in the southern half of Wales: the Bannau Brycheiniog / Brecon Beacons National Park, southern Cambrian Mountains and highest Preseli hills.



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General Summary for Tuesday, 7 July, 2026



British Mountain Summary:
Based on forecast chart for noon 7 July, 2026

Windy over high terrain, strongest in the morning, again later in Scotland. Damp and murky north and western Highlands, more persistent rain at times. Some improvement southern Highlands in afternoon. Often dry for northern England, but higher fells shrouded in cloud. Brighter for Wales as cloud thins.

Headline for Brecon Beacons

Blustery start, easing. Varied cloud clearing to warm sun.

Detailed Forecast for Tuesday, 7 July, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	West-northwesterly 25mph from dawn to early morning, gusty 30mph in places, not just over high tops. Easing to 15-20mph by middle of day, often less into afternoon, then rising a little up to dusk to 20mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Ease of walking affected due to gusts over high terrain and downslope to the east in morning, trending towards fairly small effects.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	No rain expected
Cloud on the hills?	Early varied cloud largely clears Varied banks of cloud in the morning in several layers, most persistent in west; highest tops near or above some cloud banks. Banks lift somewhat through morning but will largely dissipate with time, largely clear afternoon.
Chance of cloud free summits?	50% morning, rising to 90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Glimpses of early sun mainly east, becoming sunnier widely with time; thin high cloud. Very good visibility.
How Cold? (at 750m)	13 to 15C, rising to 17C, little change with added, height, tops start warmer. Feeling like 5C if exposed to early wind on tops.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

Hills clear Some coastal fog may affect lowest slopes near the sea, possibly also some mist inland valleys at dawn, but the hills clear.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Above 90%	Above 90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Sunshine and thin fair-weather cloud. Visibility very good.	Generally sunny, thin high cloud. Visibility very good, some low-level haze.
How Cold? (at 750m)	15C rising to 20C afternoon.	16C rising to 22C afternoon.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.	Above the summits.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 8 July, 2026**

A drier and warmer window builds into the middle of this week: very warm in England and Wales. Still low cloud persistent especially toward northwest Scotland, but spells of sunshine spread northward, and lighter wind. Some rain late this week in western Scotland though mostly light and patchy, many places dry. High pressure expands across Scotland through the weekend bringing more widely clearer hills, dry and warm conditions in the extended outlook into mid July - easterly winds likely develop, particularly England and Wales; a chance of some isolated thunderstorms occasionally.
