

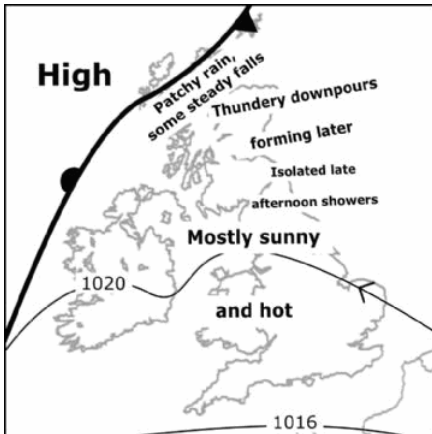
Brecon Beacons

General Summary for Friday, 10 July, 2026



British Mountain Summary:
Based on forecast chart for noon 10 July, 2026

Hot sunshine persists across England, Wales, and southern Scotland; valley temperatures of 30C+. Starting bright and becoming very warm most of Scottish Highlands. Rain from Lochaber northward, later moving east with heavy thundery bursts forming over central/east highlands into evening.

Headline for Brecon Beacons

Hot sunshine; fair weather cloud builds, small risk late spotty rain

Detailed Forecast for Friday, 10 July, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	Generally southeasterly but variable, 10-15mph. Sustained speeds will trend lower, but variable gusts increasingly common through afternoon.
Effect of wind on you?	Small, some nuisance gustiness forming afternoon.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Entirely dry most or all day Late in the afternoon, small chance of an isolated burst of rain; most hills remain entirely dry.
Cloud on the hills?	Hills clear Some early sea fog may drift onto low coastal slopes of the Cambrians, but this soon burning back after dawn for clear hills.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Practically certain
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Strong sunshine, some thin high cloud, fair weather cloud building afternoon. Visibility good but some haze.
How Cold? (at 750m)	20C at dawn, rising to 25 or 26C; may be even warmer over Black Mountains where valley temperatures may approach 32 or 33C. Rather humid on slopes facing the sea.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

Brecon Beacons - Looking Ahead

How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Northeasterly 10-20mph. Strengthening trend into nighttime. Mostly small.	Easterly sustained speeds of 20-25mph, often gusting 30mph over tops, or stronger in the morning. Ease of walking affected on exposed terrain, notable buffeting gusts early reaching middle slopes.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	No rain expected	No rain expected
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Hills clear Nearly certain	Hills soon clear Scattered ribbons of cloud on easternmost hills between 500-800m, these soon thinning and dissipating. Above 90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Extensive sunshine, patchy fair weather cloud building afternoon. Very good visibility.	Mostly sunny, some thin high cloud. Good visibility, a light haze.
How Cold? (at 750m) Freezing Level	19 or 20C, rising to 23 or 24C, warmest on south slopes (valleys up to 30C). Above the summits.	14 or 15C rising to 22C; valley temperatures approach 28C. Above the summits.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Saturday, 11 July, 2026**

Staying warm in Scotland, hot for England and Wales into the weekend. High pressure shifts northward, facilitating a strengthening easterly wind across most areas. Some lingering cloud and rain over the Scottish Highlands Saturday with some risk of heavier thundery bursts on Saturday morning in the east. The weekend is likely dry across England and Wales with fairly extensive sun, some sea fog increasingly affecting northeastern hill groups later weekend.

Easterly wind persists next week, sometimes quite strong England and Wales. Mostly sunny and very warm, including Scottish Highlands. Low pressure south of the country starts pushing showers into Wales, some heavy and thundery, though confidence is low. Detail increasing uncertain later next week, but Scotland likely stays dry.
