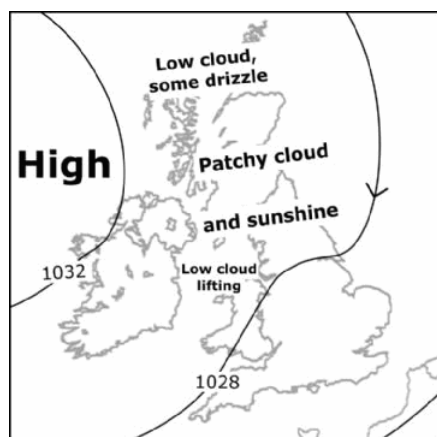

General Summary for Monday, 20 July, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 20 July, 2026

Some patchy drizzle and low cloud covering many northern mountains in the Highlands in the morning. Cloud persists on hills toward northwest coasts, tending to lift and break further inland. Hills in England & Wales mostly clear. Wind fairly light overall. Very dry ground and high fire risk remains.

Headline for Brecon Beacons

Light wind. Dry and warm, sun and fair-weather cloud, hills clear.

Detailed Forecast for Monday, 20 July, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	Northerly 5-15mph; both speed and direction variable.
Effect of wind on you?	Mostly small.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	No rain expected
Cloud on the hills?	Hills clear
Chance of cloud free summits?	Nearly certain
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Often sunny, fair weather cloud building afternoon. Very good visibility.
How Cold? (at 750m)	12C rising to 18 or 19C, warmest east; coastal Cambrians/Preseli hills stay a degree cooler.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

Brecon Beacons - Looking Ahead

	Tuesday 21 July	Wednesday 22 July
How windy? (On the summits)	North to northwesterly 5 to 15mph, increasing a little during day.	North to northwesterly 15 to 20mph, typically strongest western tops, at times 25mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Small.	Mostly small effect on walking, but feeling breezy on higher exposed terrain, especially western areas.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Largely dry Small chance of an isolated shower inland late in the day toward evening.	Rare if any light rain Some drizzle may affect coastal hills facing Cardigan Bay in the morning, fading. Chance of an isolated light shower inland and south toward Brecon Beacons later.
Cloud on the hills?	Generally clear Rare brief patches on higher slopes, mainly morning toward the west.	Some early cloud lifting and clearing Patchy cloud in the morning, locally to 600m toward west coast, mostly above 700m inland, well broken toward south. Most cloud lifting above the hills through middle of day.
Chance of cloud free summits?	90%	60% rising above 90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Patchwork of cloud and sun, sunshine best near coast in afternoon. Visibility very good.	Patchwork of cloud and sun, cloudier toward west in morning. Visibility very good.
How Cold? (at 750m)	13C rising to 17C afternoon Brecon Beacons, slightly cooler western tops.	12C rising to 16C.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.	Above the summits.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 21 July, 2026

Largely dry weather prevails as high pressure remains nearby to the west. A northwesterly flow keeps temperatures nearer to average for the time of year, dawn temperatures in the middle single digits in Scotland; staying warm in England and Wales but maximum summit temperatures only to the high teens. Cloud and drizzle affects northwest Scotland more often, occasionally drifting further south. Despite this, ground remains very dry with high fire risk, with ongoing wildfire management limiting access in places. A more unsettled trend develops during next weekend, bringing wind, rain and showers first to Scotland and increasingly widely. England and Wales remain quite warm.
