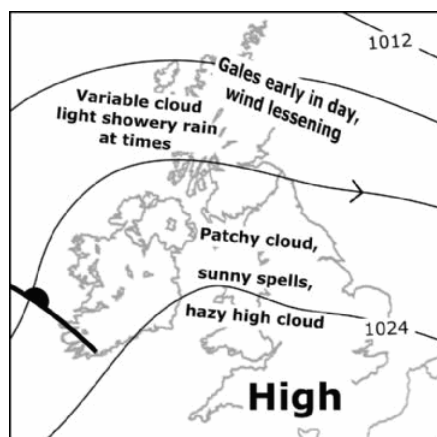

General Summary for Saturday, 5 September, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 5 September, 2026

Brisk and chilly westerly winds in the morning, starting gale-force on high tops in Scotland, but lowering speeds. A little light rain, brief showers mainly western Scotland with varied cloud on tops. Often dry with cloud breaks to tops for eastern Highlands, England and Wales, some sun and hazy high cloud.

Headline for Brecon Beacons

Fairly light wind, generally dry, most hills soon clear.

Detailed Forecast for Saturday, 5 September, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	Westerly 25mph at dawn, soon easing in morning to 15mph or less, turning southwesterly; tending to rise again later in day to 20-25mph, occasional stronger gusts evening into night.
Effect of wind on you?	Feeling cool in early breeze, but soon mostly small. Becoming blustery again later in day.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Largely dry A brief drizzly shower west Cambrians early in day. During afternoon, possibly odd spots from high cloud in west, but more likely dry.
Cloud on the hills?	Mostly clearing Patchy cloud over some slopes above 700m early morning. Lifting above the summits by mid-morning.
Chance of cloud free summits?	80%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	A little sun soon weakening as high cloud builds then thickens across the sky. Visibility very good.
How Cold? (at 750m)	8C rising to 11C afternoon, little change or rising a degree or so higher evening/night. Feeling like 2C in wind at first.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

Brecon Beacons - Looking Ahead

	Sunday 6 September	Monday 7 September
How windy? (On the summits)	South to southwesterly 30 to 40mph, may rise further afternoon; very gusty in places around high terrain.	Southwesterly 25 to 35mph, speeds likely rising during day to 45mph on high tops.
Effect of wind on you?	Buffeting affecting ease of walking over high terrain. Feeling cool in exposure despite warm air.	Walking increasingly uncomfortable in exposure, strenuous conditions develop with buffeting gusts. Marked wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	A little rain west Drizzle and some light rain for periods mainly southwest hills. A band of more frequent rain spreads from the west into night.	Early rain, then showery Rain from overnight may continue through dawn, but breaking up to leave only spotty showers for a time. With time, more frequent showery rain may return.
Cloud on the hills?	Mostly toward coast Varied low cloud, but may cover areas near Irish Sea all day, but bases higher inland and often clearer mid and east Wales.	Lifting to tops, some breaks Early varied cloud over the hills, lifting during morning to mostly patches over higher tops, breaks best east & mid Wales, more frequent for periods Pen-y-Fan west above 700m. Lower patches in showers.
Chance of cloud free summits?	80%	40%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Some weak sun through high cloud. Slight haze.	Glimpses of sun mainly east Wales. A slight haze, particularly southwest, visibility reduced in rain.
How Cold? (at 750m) Freezing Level	13C, humid all day, rising to 17C, locally warmer east. Feeling like 5 to 8C directly in the wind. Above the summits.	8 or 9C, little change all day. Feeling like 0 to -3C in the wind on tops. Above the summits.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Sunday, 6 September, 2026

Generally unsettled onward into next week with spells of rain and showers moving in from the Atlantic , accompanied by frequently strong to gale force mountain winds. Temperatures will vary, mildest toward the south, but cooler air moves in from the north at times bringing higher Scottish tops occasionally close to freezing point. Indications favour improving weather patterns during mid-month as high pressure builds from the south.
