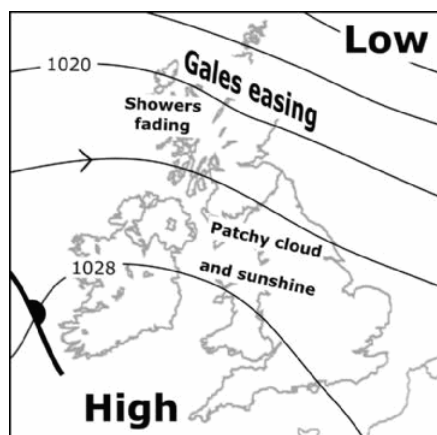

General Summary for Sunday, 20 September, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 20 September, 2026

Gale-force winds over Scottish mountains early in the day lessen, but staying blustery and feeling chilly, for northern areas in particular. Showery rain in the west in the morning fading. Cloud base rising with good breaks forming, sunny spells best toward east. Lightest winds for Wales.

Headline for Brecon Beacons

Strongest wind at first, largely dry, hills clear.

Detailed Forecast for Sunday, 20 September, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	Westerly 25mph early morning, easing to 15-20mph, then often below 15mph by afternoon.
Effect of wind on you?	Blustery and rather cool early in the day, but moderating to be fairly small.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Little or no rain Local drizzly showers possible over west Wales early in day fading. Some drizzle returns into the night in west.
Cloud on the hills?	Lifting for a time Patchy cloud grazing higher slopes above 700-800m in the morning, mostly in west. Tending to thin and break above the tops. Into night, blanket low cloud rolls in from west.
Chance of cloud free summits?	80%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Varied high cloud likely thickens to cover the sky. Slight haze west and south, very good visibility eastern hills.
How Cold? (at 750m)	7C rising to 9C, then tending to rise further onward into night. Feeling close to 0C in early wind.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

Brecon Beacons - Looking Ahead

	Monday 21 September	Tuesday 22 September
How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Westerly 20-25mph early in day, some gusty slopes, but speeds tending to lessen during day to 10-15mph or less. Breezy for a time, but becoming mostly small.	South to southwesterly 10 to 20mph. Mostly small.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Local drizzle Some fine drizzle where in cloud, mostly western Cambrians; drier toward south and east Wales.	Damp air mostly west Fine drizzle where in cloud and on some lower slopes too toward west Wales. More often dry eastern areas.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Lowest and most persistent west Blanket cloud shrouding many hills, foggy from low-mid elevations up in the morning. Some highest tops may be near top of the cloud sheet. Cloud may slowly thin and lift, but western hills unlikely to clear. 30%	Fairly extensive, lifting higher Low cloud from many lower hill slopes upward and some fog banks into valleys too in the morning. Cloud tending to drift higher up and breaks forming gradually, soonest in east. Banks of cloud may linger all day on south/western aspects. 30%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Some sun mostly develops in east Wales. Misty poor visibility over hills, some improvement may develop in east, hazy then perhaps very good later.	Largely cloudy, misty or hazy; glimpses of sun breaking through in places, mainly eastern valleys; some improvement during the day.
How Cold? (at 750m) Freezing Level	13 to 15C, little change into night; quite humid. Above the summits.	12 to 14C, humid; little change into evening and night. Above the summits.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Monday, 21 September, 2026

Warm and humid air from the southwest extends across Britain early in the new week, cloaking many hills in fog and drizzle, to lower slopes near western coasts. A band of steadier rain is likely to be draped over northwest Scotland by Tuesday. Best of cloud breaks in areas further east and northeast. Rain then passes eastwards into Wednesday followed by a few showers, lower humidity and cloud bases lifting. Later in the week, areas of low pressure toward the northwest likely still bring periods of stronger winds to Scotland at least and a risk of rain at times mainly in the west, but a trend toward higher pressure and drier weather more often for the end of September into the start of October.

Forecast issued at 16:00 on Saturday, 19 September, 2026
