

General Summary for Saturday, 22 November, 2025



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 22 November, 2025

As less cold air penetrates the UK, only higher summits in Scotland will remain below freezing point. Nevertheless, much mountains terrain will remain frozen and icy. Rain and strong winds overnight will have eased to in Scotland and through the morning will clear Wales and N England.

Headline for Cairngorms NP and Monadhliath

A few showers; mountains extensively foggy. Terrain mostly frozen.

Detailed Forecast for Saturday, 22 November, 2025

How windy? (On the Munros)	Westerly 20 to 25mph. Will tend to ease through the afternoon.	
Effect of wind on you?	Mostly fairly small, although particularly in the morning still considerable wind chill where exposed.	
How wet?	Risk of a few showers; fresh snow confined above 800m	
(Precipitation and its impact)	A few showers west of A9 - very few and brief eastward toward Deeside.	
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive - although some higher slopes may gradually clear	
	Very varied; overall most mountains cloud covered, in some areas from valleys up. Nevertheless, particularly afternoon, breaks to higher slopes - sometimes above fog lower down.	
Chance of cloud free Munros?	20%	
Sunshine?	Patches of sun coming through in places above fog, most widely eastern Cairngorms NP.	
Air clarity (below cloud)	Visibility varied, areas of fog (sometimes in or just above valleys), but otherwise very good.	
How Cold? (at 900m)	1C. Feeling like -7C directly in the wind.	
Freezing Level	1000m; but much terrain from valleys up frozen.

How windy? (On the Munros) Effect of wind on you?	Easterly, speeds at present uncertain, but probably in the range 20 to 35mph. Expect blustery conditions, perhaps considerable buffeting and wind chill over some mountains.	Northerly, between 20 and 30mph - may reach 35mph Cairngorms east to Lochnagar. Walking often arduous, particularly near precipitation, where in gusty conditions, balance tricky.
How wet?	Rain or hill snow on and off	Frequent snow and hail showers
(Precipitation and its impact)	Precipitation intermittently, most likely focussed on eastern hills in Cairngorms NP. Snow above 700-900m.	Frequent hail or snow showers above 400m, particularly Cairngorms and Deeside, where precipitation at times constant. Fewest showers (generally flurries) southern summits in Cairngorms NP east to Ben Alder.
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive across the mountains	Extensively covering higher areas; highest cloud base toward south
	Persistent fog most mountains, widely above 500 to 700m - perhaps reaching 900m near Cairngorm ski centre and west of the A9.	Cairngorms east to Lochnagar: cloud base varying as showers coming and going: typically 600m, but shafts of cloud below 400m near precipitation. Higher cloud base southern summits in Cairngorms NP east to Ben Alder, here breaks to 900m.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	Less than 10%	10%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Cloudy or dull; general visibility very good, but widely foggy on the hills.	Bursts of sunshine, mainly or only southern summits in Cairngorms NP east to Ben Alder. Very poor or appalling visibility in snow, but otherwise, very good.
How Cold? (at 900m)	Around 0C. Will feel as cold as minus 10C directly in the wind.	-1C Will feel as cold as minus 11C directly in the wind.
Freezing Level	800 to 1050m; some lower areas may still be partly frozen.	700m.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Sunday, 23 November, 2025

Another brief burst of cold air on Monday and Tuesday will bring further snow to northern Scotland. By Wednesday, milder air together with rain and strong wind will be extending across Britain. Rain and strong wind will be frequent, particularly on western mountains for the remainder of the week. In Scotland temperatures on the Munros will sometimes be below freezing point, but fresh snow probably transient, whereas elsewhere, snow rare if any.
