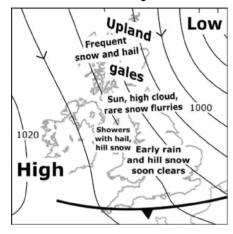

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General Summary for Thursday, 1 January, 2026



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 1 January, 2026

Cold north-northwesterly winds, widely gale force over the mountains, difficult conditions with severe chill factor on Scottish high tops. Showery snow and hail frequent in northern Scotland. Rare showers central Scotland and northern England. Early rain and hill snow followed by showers in Wales.

Headline for Cairngorms NP and Monadhliath

Gales, severe on high tops; snow and hail to lower slopes.

Detailed Forecast for Thursday, 1 January, 2026

How windy? (On the Munros)	Northwesterly 45 to 60mph, sustained speeds tending to widely increase, strongest higher Cairngorms, in places 70mph higher up, mainly eastern high tops, powerful squally gusts in showers.		
Effect of wind on you?	Arduous walking conditions in exposure, difficult with constant buffeting high tops, gusts could knock you over. Significant wind chill, severe higher up.		
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Snow and hail, most often north Showers or sometimes more persistent falls of snow moving across the northern Cairngorms and Monadhliath, also hail, falling to lower slopes. Periods of whiteout on hills. Less precipitation toward Glen Garry.		
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free Munros?	Often covering tops Cloud base varying, but often capping higher slopes above 700-900m, most persistent northern areas. Some breaks above 900-1000m Drumochter to Deeside. 30%		
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Largely cloudy north, glimpses of sun more often south. Visibility very poor for periods in snow and cloud, but intermittently very good.		
How Cold? (at 900m)	-3C (-5C high tops), falling to -5 to -7C into night. Wind chill feeling like -15C, to -20C higher Cairngorms.		
Freezing Level	Near or below freezing from the glens upward; most terrain frozen.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Friday, 2 January, 2026

Terrain extensively frozen onward into the weekend and early next week at least; sub-zero temperatures from the glens upward in Scotland and some valleys inland in northern England. Substantial fresh snow accumulations in the North West Highlands and Cairngorms, heavy showers streaming in from the north also containing hail. Largely dry and sunny from central Scotland to northern England. Hail and snow showers will run into north and west Wales from the sea. Bitter northerly winds, up to gale force higher tops, tending to lessen into Sunday. Some fluctuation of freezing level during next week, but some fronts moving in from northwest likely bring snowfall to hills at times more widely.
