

General Summary for Wednesday, 2 April, 2025



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 2 April, 2025

Dry and widely sunny. Low slopes and valleys near east coasts may see patchy dawn mist, some reaching higher terrain in England, though soon dissipating. A gusty breeze in all areas, notably along Scotland's west coast and down western slopes in England and Wales. Strongest winds in Wales with a risk of gales in the morning.

Headline for Lake District

Gusty winds across most terrain. Dry and sunny.

Detailed Forecast for Wednesday, 2 April, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Southeasterly 20-30mph, strongest winds early. Frequent gusts, particularly through elevated passes and including lowest slopes early.	
Effect of wind on you?	Walking and balance starting to be affected in highest winds. Feeling cool in exposure.	
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	No precipitation	
Cloud on the hills?	No cloud	
Chance of cloud free summits?	Practically certain	
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Extensive sunshine. Visibility excellent.	
How Cold? (at 750m)	5C, rising a few degrees, up to 8C around Grasmoor/Grisedale Peak. Feeling near -3C in stronger wind.	
Freezing Level	Above the summits. Slight frost in valleys at dawn.

Effect of wind on you?	Stability challenged on exposed terrain. Sudden buffeting gusts, including low slopes. Feeling chilly.	Walking becoming impeded, at times strenuous. Stability affected in buffeting gusts. Feeling chilly.

Cloud on the hills?	Little or none	No cloud expected

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Thursday, 3 April, 2025

High pressure is centered to the northeast through the weekend, with the core of high pressure meandering near the British Isles into the next week. Extensively dry and warm with frequent sunshine. Some high cloud may come and go, becoming more frequent later in the week. Chilly mornings in valleys, slight frost and sometimes misty where sheltered, though mists will soon clear for mostly cloud-free days. East to southeasterly winds prevail, gusty in places, strongest speeds for Wales.
