

General Summary for Saturday, 26 April, 2025



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 26 April, 2025

Rain and low cloud will reach mainly western mountains ahead of a weakening front. Generally a slow improvement through the day as the rain increasingly fizzles out and away from south facing coastal hills, cloud base rises. Blustery Scottish Highlands, particularly NW.

Headline for Lake District

Light wind. A little rain, mainly morning.

Detailed Forecast for Saturday, 26 April, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Southerly 15mph.	
Effect of wind on you?	Small.	
How wet?	Rain now and again, mainly morning.	
(Precipitation and its impact)	A little rain occasionally, mainly morning.	
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive on higher areas, particularly morning	
	Cloud base generally 400 to 650m morning, although lower at times southern fells. There will be a trend toward higher bases through the day when breaks above 750m may occur north lakes.	
Chance of cloud free summits?	Less than 10%, but later rising to 40% north lakes	
Sunshine?	Occasional sun, mainly afternoon north lakes.	
Air clarity (below cloud)	Misty in rain, but otherwise visibility mostly excellent.	
How Cold? (at 750m)	7C	
Freezing Level	Above the summits

Lake District - Looking Ahead

	Sunday 27 April	Monday 28 April
How windy? (On the summits)	South to southwesterly, in the range 30 to perhaps 40mph on higher tops.	Southwesterly between 15 and possibly 25mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Expect considerable buffeting and wind chill where exposed on higher areas.	Fairly small.
How wet?	Risk of a little drizzle	Rain unlikely
(Precipitation and its impact)	Risk pockets of drizzle southern and western fells, most likely morning.	Chance of a little fine drizzle morning south lakes.
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive western and southern fells	All or nearly all clearing
	South lakes and westernmost fells elsewhere: Fog may be persistent above 300 to 450m particularly coastal slopes. North lakes: Patches may spill over from south onto higher tops particularly morning, but probably mostly or all clearing	Fog may shroud lowest slopes near the coast, but higher areas may be above the cloud. Cloud may temporarily form on higher slopes before largely or completely clearing.
Chance of cloud free summits?	20% south lakes to 60% north	70%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Patches of sunshine probable east and north Cumbria. Good visibility but a haze.	Sunshine soon extensive and visibility excellent.
How Cold? (at 750m)	7C, but will feel as cold as minus 2C directly in the wind.	9C
Freezing Level	Above the summits.	Above the summits

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Sunday, 27 April, 2025

Much of Britain will be fine and sunny through much of next week. Temperatures, after being very warm, could well drop markedly on Thursday (Scotland) or Friday (England and Wales). Westerly winds in N Scotland may well maintain more mixed weather here, with occasional rain and cloud across higher summits.
