

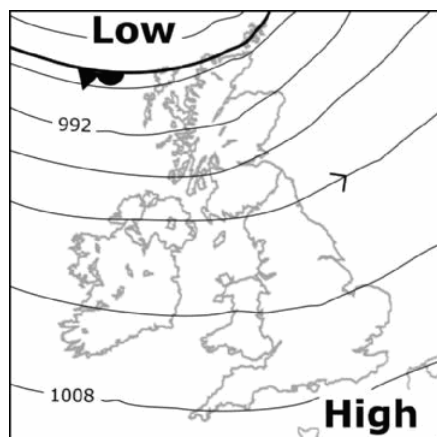
Lake District

The entire Lake District National Park, taking in all major summits, including Scafell, Helvellyn, Skiddaw, the Langdales and Old Man of Coniston.



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General Summary for Wednesday, 4 June, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 4 June, 2025

Cold: showers (very frequent west) of hail and on higher slopes snow and gale force upland winds. Southward into England and Wales, a little less cold, progressively fewer showers and decreasingly windy.

Headline for Lake District

Blustery. Showers. Cloud shrouding higher fells, particularly southern fells.

Detailed Forecast for Wednesday, 4 June, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Southwesterly 25 to intermittently 30mph on higher tops.
Effect of wind on you?	Mostly fairly small, although noticeably impeding ease of walking on higher tops where wind chill considerable.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Showers, may be frequent for an hour or so. Scattered showers - in places the rain frequent over an hour or midday to mid afternoon; then extensively dry.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Extensive south lakes; confined to higher tops elsewhere South lakes and westernmost fells elsewhere: Cloud base varying; there may be breaks to 700m, but patches could well form at times afternoon and evening below 450m. North lakes: Cloud sometimes forming above 800m, but breaking off higher tops for 20% south to 80% north
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Bursts of sunshine western hills; sunnier at times eastern areas. Visibility very good although a haze.
How Cold? (at 750m) Freezing Level	4C rising to 6 or 7C. Feeling below freezing point where exposed to the wind. Above the summits

How windy? (On the summits)	Southwesterly 20mph.	West backing southwesterly 15mph
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small.	Small
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Largely dry Risk of a little rain or in south lakes patches of drizzle, most likely afternoon. Total rainfall small	Risk of scattered showers Briefly heavy showers here and there.
Cloud on the hills?	Confidence low: may persist across south lakes South lakes and western fells elsewhere: Confidence low, cloud base may rise to 750m for periods, but threat of cloud lowering for periods to around 400m. North lakes: cloud mostly confined to or above 850m by late morning.	Clearing most, perhaps nearly all summits by afternoon Cloud base rising; by late morning most cloud above the summits, particularly north lakes. May continue to come and go above 750m southern fells.
Chance of cloud free summits?	20% south to 60% north	80% by midday
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Sunshine from time to time, particularly north lakes. Visibility mostly very good or excellent.	Patches of sunshine, although particularly morning, mostly cloudy the coast. Excellent visibility.
How Cold? (at 750m)	6C.	6C near the coast, rising to 9C well inland.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.	Above the summits.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Thursday, 5 June, 2025

Remaining chilly (intermittently near freezing point highest Scottish summits) for the remainder of the week - and probably most of next week. Rainfall and low cloud will remain frequent across particularly western mountains. Often windy higher summits - although mostly speeds below gale force.
