








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General Summary for Monday, 29 September, 2025



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 29 September, 2025

Scotland: Southwesterly winds with a warm front bringing cloud and patchy rain into afternoon for western hills. Eastern hills substantially clear with morning sunshine.

England/Wales: Sunshine giving way to veil of cloud, with will lower onto higher western tops with local drizzle. Dry elsewhere.

Headline for Lake District

Sunny start, but fog banks. Clouding over afternoon, patchy cloud tops.

Detailed Forecast for Monday, 29 September, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Southwesterly 10-15mph. A slight rise later in the day with some gusts.	
Effect of wind on you?	Small, though gusts becoming notable late in the day.	
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Patchy drizzle southwest Patchy drizzly rain drifts onto southwest coastal fells occasionally. Some patchy light rain possible more widely late in the day.	
Cloud on the hills?	Mostly ragged patches, may fill in later.	
	From dawn, valley mist with a few cloud banks from middle elevations upward, most likely from Coniston to Pillar. Patches of low cloud will tend to lift but may then cap tops at times. May fill in late in the day.	
Chance of cloud free summits?	70% lowering to 40% later in the day	
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Early sunshine, most extensive in east for a time, then a veil of cloud thickens from the west. Excellent visibility.	
How Cold? (at 750m)	7 or 8C.	
Freezing Level	Above the summits

Lake District - Looking Ahead

	Tuesday 30 September	Wednesday 1 October
How windy? (On the summits)	South to southwesterly, 15 to 20mph, occasionally 25mph higher fells.	South to south-westerly 15 to 30mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small, but may start to affect balance on exposed ridges.	Blustery at times with a marked wind chill over the tops.
How wet?	Drizzly rain mostly southwest	Occasional rain an drizzle
(Precipitation and its impact)	A little rain or drizzle, most common on fells toward west and south Lakeland. Further north and east more often dry or just patchy drizzle.	Occasional rain, may well be persistent for a few hours in the morning when some heavy falls may occur.
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive, lowest south/west	Extensive
	Shrouding many fells all day, most persistent over south and southwestern fells, from lower elevations up for periods near coast, fairly extensive above 600m inland. Some breaks toward north/east.	Extensive cloud will cover the fells in fog throughout the day. Bases varying, but often around 500-700m. Best breaks in the northeast.
Chance of cloud free summits?	20%	20%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Overcast, rare glimpses of sun mainly northeastern areas.	Little or no sun.
	Visibility poor where damp, better north Lakes, good below cloud.	Visibility sometimes poor due to rain.
How Cold? (at 750m)	8C, little change all day where in cloud, clearer spots rising to 10C.	10C
Freezing Level	Above the summits	Above the summits

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 30 September, 2025

Next week the UK is situated under a boundary between high and low pressure with a trend towards more settled conditions in the south, unsettled in the north. Northwest England and west Scotland could be rather wet with a southwesterly wind pushing cloud and spells of rain onto western hills. Several more organized frontal systems are likely to pass into eastern Scotland as well. Generally dry for the Pennines and Wales, though cloud and occasionally drizzly rain will impact western areas, notably Lakeland and Snowdonia. Sun breaks likely in England but short-lived. First indications of more widely unsettled weather into next weekend as a deeper area of low pressure passes north, though confidence remains low regarding timing and strength.
