

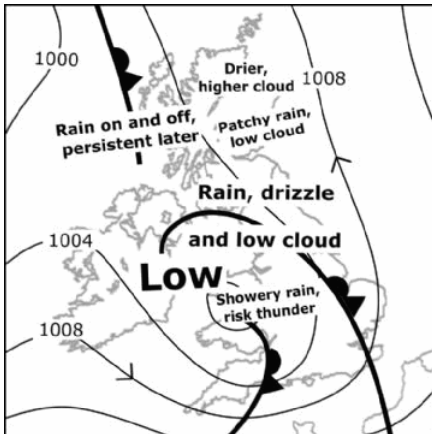
Lake District

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General Summary for Saturday, 6 June, 2026



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 6 June, 2026

Patchy rain toward the south of the Highlands, and tends to become more persistent west coasts. Varied low cloud, higher breaks generally north. A swathe of rain and low cloud northern England and southern Scotland. Clusters of showery rain for Wales, heavy bursts with local thunder. Wind speeds varying.

Headline for Lake District

Breezy start, easing. Rain, low cloud, later showers.

Detailed Forecast for Saturday, 6 June, 2026

<p>How windy? (On the summits)</p> <p>Effect of wind on you?</p>	<p>South-southeasterly 25 to 35mph early morning, but easing through middle of day to 20mph, or less by later afternoon. Then turning southwesterly into evening, increasing through dusk, to 25-35mph into night.</p> <p>Blustery early in day, feeling cool and may affect comfortable walking on tops for a time, but lessening to then become fairly small until late evening.</p>
<p>How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)</p>	<p>Rain most persistent south, some heavier bursts form</p> <p>Rain most persistent southern Lakes from early morning for several hours, patchier north at first, but some steady rain mixed with drizzle extends to all areas. Through middle of day, rain breaking up, but southern areas remain often drizzle. Further pulses of showery rain widely later afternoon drifting north into evening, locally</p>
<p>Cloud on the hills?</p> <p>Chance of cloud free summits?</p>	<p>Fairly extensive, lowest south</p> <p>Cloud banks already covering south and western tops from early in day, filling in more widely and lowering, to low-mid slopes southern fells in rain; highest bases toward north Lakes, perhaps a few broken moments.</p> <p>20%</p>
<p>Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)</p>	<p>Overcast, dull, some brighter moments afternoon.</p> <p>Visibility good where dry if below cloud, but reducing in rain, poor at times, especially south.</p>
<p>How Cold? (at 750m)</p> <p>Freezing Level</p>	<p>6C rising to 9C afternoon, then dropping again into night.</p> <p>Feeling near/below freezing in the wind.</p> <p>Above the summits.</p>

Lake District - Looking Ahead

	Sunday 7 June	Monday 8 June
How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Southwesterly 25-35mph, gusty over high summits, and deteriorating; sustained speeds may reach 40mph+ afternoon. Walking often strenuous in exposure with notable wind chill, risk deteriorating - stability increasingly challenging.	Southwesterly 20 to 25mph. Fairly small effect on walking, but feeling blustery and a noticeable chill on exposed high terrain.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Patchy light rain, may set in Patches of rain will drift from the southwest throughout the day, falls amounting to little through morning. More substantial falls later in the day, may set in.	Showery rain A band of rain clears eastward around dawn, briefly heavy. Then broadly showery, frequent rain for periods western fells, but some drier moments.
Cloud on the hills?	Lifting to high terrain, later deteriorating May be fairly extensive from 500m up in the early hours, or lower to the southwest. Bases rise with time, may clear east and north summits, but highest tops and west slopes may often be in cloud above 700-800m, lower later.	Often capping western tops Varied cloud banks often over west and southwest fells above 800m, some lower patches in showers. Some breaks to tops more often north and east.
Chance of cloud free summits?	40%	40%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Sunshine increasingly weakened by high cloud through the day, more patchy to the west. Good visibility but a haze toward the coasts in particular.	Brief bursts of sun. Visibility good away from showers and below cloud.
How Cold? (at 750m) Freezing Level	8 or 9C, may locally reach 10C east fells. Feeling just below freezing in strongest wind. Above the summits.	5 or 6C. Feeling below freezing directly in the wind. Above the summits.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Sunday, 7 June, 2026**

Generally unsettled next week - showers affect most hills Monday and Tuesday, lowest cloud and most persistent rain along western slopes, but with some breaks as well with sunshine. Risk of a deeper area of lower pressure from Wednesday or later bringing widespread strong winds, probably gales over many summits, with prolonged heavy rain. Temperatures trending milder again into next weekend, pressure may begin to rise in the south to give drier weather more widely with time.
