

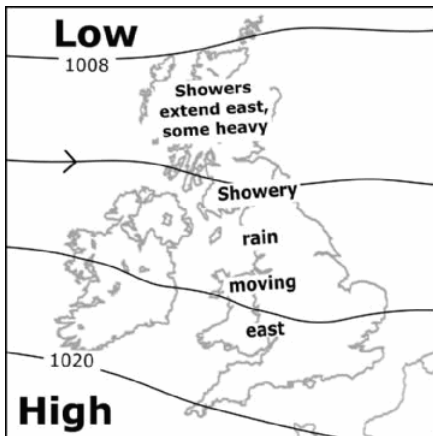

General Summary for Wednesday, 10 June, 2026



**British Mountain Summary:
Based on forecast chart for noon 10 June, 2026**

Showery westerlies, scattered bursts of rain moving eastward across the country, locally heavy with a chance of thunder, mainly eastern areas by afternoon. Improving to drier and brighter conditions for western England and Wales with time. Breezes tending to freshen. Feeling rather cool.

Headline for Lake District

Showers easing. Breeze increasing.

Detailed Forecast for Wednesday, 10 June, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	Westerly 15 to 25mph, tending to rise into afternoon, 30mph on higher fells afternoon and into evening.
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small in morning, more noticeably blustery with time, marked wind chill where exposed to the strongest breeze.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Showery, risk thunder; then improving Showers spread inland from west in morning and develop to give heavy bursts for a few hours, Risk some hail, isolated thunder. Showers clear eastward to be drier by later afternoon. Local light showers in evening.
Cloud on the hills?	Often covering tops, rising Varying, but tops often covered through the day, especially towards west coast in the morning. Breaks to tops best in afternoon away from showers.
Chance of cloud free summits?	50%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Variable cloud and patchy sun, best sun early in day well inland. Visibility mostly good, but poor in showers.
How Cold? (at 750m)	3C lifting to 6C. Feeling below freezing in the stronger breeze, near -5C highest tops.
Freezing Level	Above the summits

Lake District - Looking Ahead

	Thursday 11 June	Friday 12 June
How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Southerly turning west-southwesterly later, 20 to 35mph, risk reaching 40mph mainly afternoon onward. Varied, but risk often blustery over higher terrain, may increasingly affect comfortable walking. Marked wind chill.	Westerly, 25 to 40mph. Strenuous walking where exposed over high terrain, some buffeting gusts starting to affect balance. Marked wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Persistent rain Rain arriving from before dawn, some steadier heavier falls for periods through the morning. Rain tends to break up in afternoon, but still drizzly rain on and off.	Light rain and drizzle Generally damp over many fells, with light rain and drizzle on and off much of the day, most persistent western Lakes. Patchier drizzly showers easternmost areas.
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive low cloud Blanket low cloud across the fells, to lower slopes south and western areas, highest bases further north and east, but rarely above 600m.	Extensive, lowest west and south Persistent across the fells, foggy from lower elevations upward toward the coasts, cloud base rarely above 500m most west and southern areas. Higher bases northeast Lakes, but often shrouded above 600m.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Below 10%	10%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Overcast and dull, murky toward coasts. Poor visibility much of day in rain.	Largely cloudy, dull. Poor visibility, misty in west, locally better visibility below cloud in east.
How Cold? (at 750m) Freezing Level	5C rising to 9C. Feeling like 0 to -3C directly in wind. Above the summits.	8C rising to 10C by afternoon, slightly warmer in east if out of cloud. Feeling like 0 to -3C where exposed to wind. Above the summits.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Thursday, 11 June, 2026**

Damp westerly breezes on Friday will cloak most mountains in cloud and some drizzle, better conditions eastwards. Cool and strong westerlies persist in Scotland on Saturday, then warmer with lighter winds by Sunday. Some patchy rain remaining in west and northwest Scotland over the weekend. Pressure tends to rise from the south this weekend, bringing warmer air and drier conditions to England & Wales, although west coast mountains may hold onto cloud. Into next week, a mixed southwesterly pattern remains, windy at times with periods of rain, drizzle and low cloud most persistent in the west. Warmest in England and Wales, but cooler westerly air likely returns at times mid-late week. Higher pressure then shows more signs of expanding over the country by late next week bringing improving conditions.

Forecast issued at 16:00 on Tuesday, 9 June, 2026
