

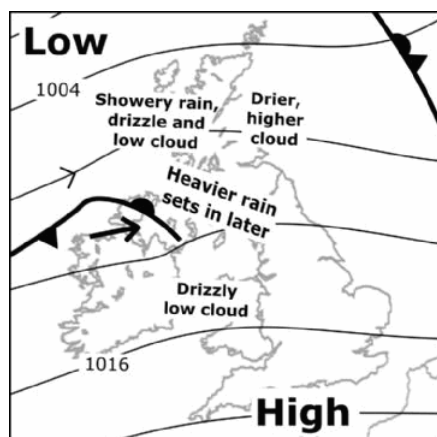

General Summary for Thursday, 3 September, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 3 September, 2026

Strong to gale-force winds over high terrain. A lot of cloud, shrouding all western hills, plus patchy rain and drizzle, becoming heavier persistent falls in the west later; a swathe of more intense rain develops for southwest Scotland into northwest England by evening, later into north Wales.

Headline for Lake District

Windy; cloudy with some rain, sustained heavy falls later.

Detailed Forecast for Thursday, 3 September, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	Southwesterly 25-40mph, variable, and may ease for a time, but a swathe of stronger wind returns late/into night.
Effect of wind on you?	Walking impeded, strenuous moments with notable wind chill; brief improvement, but deteriorating late/into night.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Patchy rain and drizzle, setting in heavy later Patchy rain drifts from the west much of the day, some early drizzle on high terrain. Falls generally light, and best of dry windows on east fells. Later afternoon onward into evening, rain sets in persistently and increasingly heavy, sustained heavy-to-torrential falls onward into night.
Cloud on the hills?	Fairly extensive, locally improving Extensive to start, to middle slopes widely and low slopes to the west. Bases will lift, best near and northeast of Helvellyn, a rising chance of breaks to tops here. Staying fairly extensive above 600m south and west Lakeland, to some lower elevations nearer the coasts; then more widely filling in again later.
Chance of cloud free summits?	10% south and west, 30% northeast.
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	A few bright glimpses on northeastern fells, but more often cloudy. Good visibility if out of cloud; hazy or mistier towards coasts.
How Cold? (at 750m)	10 or 11C; quite humid. Feeling just above freezing in strongest wind.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

Lake District - Looking Ahead

	Friday 4 September	Saturday 5 September
How windy? (On the summits)	West-southwesterly 35 to 50mph, stronger gusts to 60mph at times higher fells, more often afternoon.	Westerly 30mph at dawn, easing during morning, to 15-20mph afternoon, turning SW'ly; rising dusk onward to 40-50mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Arduous walking conditions, frequent buffeting knocking you off balance on exposed terrain. Considerable wind chill.	Blustery and chilly start, lessening to be fairly small. Then deteriorating late in day onward into night.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain on and off Overnight heavy rain clears southward by dawn, leaving it very wet underfoot and streams in spate. Patchy rain and drizzle likely to come and go, most frequent in western Lakes, some heavier showery rain mainly afternoon.	Some light showers Brief light showers mainly western fells early in the day, fading out. Evening onward, risk of some rain extending in from the southwest.
Cloud on the hills?	Varying over tops Cloud banks likely to often cap higher fells particularly in western areas above 700-800m, some higher bases afternoon, but varying around rain, may fill in again.	Mostly clearing Patchy cloud over some slopes above 700m early morning, mainly west Lakes. Lifting above 900m by late morning and often clear of all tops afternoon.
Chance of cloud free summits?	30% west, to 60% east.	70%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Fairly cloudy, glimpses of sun mostly east. Visibility often good, but reduced at times in rain, mostly in west.	Glimpses of sun in morning; high cloud tending to thicken afternoon. Visibility very good.
How Cold? (at 750m)	8 or 9C, little change all day. Directly in wind feeling like -3C.	8C rising to 11C afternoon, little change or rising a degree or so higher evening/night. Feeling near/below 0C in wind at first.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.	Above the summits.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Friday, 4 September, 2026

A series of weather systems moves in from the Atlantic over the next 10 days to bring spells of rain and showers, accompanied by frequently strong to gale force mountain winds. A window of better weather is likely on Saturday for Scotland and northern England, but further rain is expected to move in from the southwest by Saturday night and Sunday, heaviest western Scotland; a risk of more powerful upland gales developing over Scotland into Sunday. Temperatures will vary, mildest toward the south, but some cooler air moves in from the north at times bringing higher Scottish tops close to freezing point.

Forecast issued at 16:30 on Wednesday, 2 September, 2026
