
The Northwest Highlands

Areas north from Knoydart in the west, and the Great Glen towards the east (NB. Does not include Mull and areas west of Loch Linnhe, these are found in the West Highlands forecast.)



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General Summary for Tuesday, 22 October, 2024



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 22 October, 2024

Upland wind in the Scottish Highlands but lighter elsewhere. Frequent showers or drizzle in the morning, falling as sleet or hail on the higher Scottish summits. These will tend to ease in the afternoon causing the extensive morning cloud to lift and break a little.

Headline for The Northwest Highlands

Upland wind. Showers easing and cloud breaking in the afternoon.

Detailed Forecast for Tuesday, 22 October, 2024

How windy? (On the Munros)	West to southwesterly between 35 and 45mph, generally strongest toward the north.	
Effect of wind on you?	Widespread buffeting and considerable wind chill on higher areas.	
How wet?	Frequent showers morning; hail and sleet	
(Precipitation and its impact)	Showers throughout the morning, sometimes one after another. Tending to ease into the afternoon, with very little by dusk. Hail and above 1000m wet snow.	
Cloud on the hills?	Persistent fog higher slopes; highest cloud base well inland. Breaking in afternoon.	
	Cloud base will vary, dropping near precipitation. Typically in the range 500 to 800m, but often a couple of hundred metres higher easternmost summits. Tending to lift and break in the afternoon.	
Chance of cloud free Munros?	20% becoming 60%	
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Glimpses of sun only, mainly lower slopes well inland. Persistent haze.	
How Cold? (at 900m)	2C. Will feel around -10C directly in the wind.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 23 October, 2024

Generally humid and windy conditions over the next few days bringing lots of low cloud and some drizzle on western coasts. More organised rain at times from Friday and into the weekend but the potential development of a low pressure near Ireland is giving some uncertainty. Temperatures likely fluctuating over the weekend with higher summits below freezing at times.
