
# The Northwest Highlands

Areas north from Knoydart in the west, and the Great Glen towards the east (NB. Does not include Mull and areas west of Loch Linnhe, these are found in the West Highlands forecast.)



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## General Summary for Saturday, 18 January, 2025



#### British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 18 January, 2025

Southerly winds strongest toward northwest Scotland, locally very gusty. A fine day overall, with plentiful sunshine across the tops, in places above an inversion with banks of low cloud and fog on lower and some mid-elevation slopes, mostly on south-facing hills.

### Headline for The Northwest Highlands

Gusty, gales in places. Sunshine, cloud banks near Skye.

## Detailed Forecast for Saturday, 18 January, 2025

How windy? (On the Munros)	Gusty southwesterly 30 to 45mph, up to 55mph near dawn. Some variation up and down through the day.	
Effect of wind on you?	Your balance will be affected on high ground. Beware gusts throwing you further off balance on downslopes. Significant wind chill.	
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Not expected	
Cloud on the hills?	Very little if any on high ground	
	Some low clouds on windward hills of Skye and near Loch Carron.	
Chance of cloud free Munros?	70% Skye, 90% elsewhere	
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Patchy sunshine, possibly weakened by high cloud. Excellent visibility becoming superb on high ground. Hazy over the North Minch.	
How Cold? (at 900m)	2 to 4C. Chance of being warmer on the highest summits if inversion level lowers. Feeling around -10C in the wind.	
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

## Planning Outlook

#### All mountain areas of Britain from Sunday, 19 January, 2025

Slow changes in the days ahead as high pressure to the southeast slowly fades and allows weak fronts to make inroads from the west. Small amounts of precipitation until later next week - patchy drizzle in places, locally snow flurries developing as temperature falls slowly. South to southeasterly winds prevailing, locally very gusty, bringing areas of low cloud or fog - at times higher slopes clear above the cloud. Sunniest overall toward north of major hill groups. Deeper areas of low pressure over the Atlantic are expected toward late January, bringing a risk of more frequent precipitation and periods of gales or possibly stormy winds at times; fluctuating temperatures and freeze-thaw cycles.

#### Forecast issued at 16:30 on Friday, 17 January, 2025
