
The Northwest Highlands

General Summary for Tuesday, 25 March, 2025



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 25 March, 2025

Fine weather for Scotland, sunshine best toward the south and east, chance of a brief shower northwest. Chilly breezes over higher terrain. A front clearing southwards over England & Wales brings a little rain and cloud covering the hills, but improving from the north.

Headline for The Northwest Highlands

Blustery especially north. Mostly dry, broken cloud and sun.

Detailed Forecast for Tuesday, 25 March, 2025

How windy? (On the Munros)	Westerly 25 to 40mph, strongest on northern mountains around Ben Hope in the morning.	
Effect of wind on you?	Affecting balance and comfortable walking where exposed. Frequent buffeting on northern tops. Considerable wind chill.	
How wet? (Precipitation and its	Light showers in morning	
impact)	Occasional brief showery rain in the breeze, mostly west coastal mountains in the morning; sleet on highest tops at first.	
Cloud on the hills?	Varied over western tops, lifting	
	Patches of cloud come and go on western hills above 700 to 900m, tending to rise higher with time, breaking above the tops. Breaks most common over eastern hills.	
Chance of cloud free Munros?	40%	
Sunshine?	A little sunshine in and out, best in eastern areas.	
Air clarity (below cloud)	Visibility very good, slight haze near west coast.	
How Cold? (at 900m)	2C. Wind chill feeling like -7 to -10C.	
Freezing Level	Just above highest summits.

How windy? (On the Munros)	Southwesterly, strengthening 30 to 50mph, risk 60-70mph higher mountains later afternoon.	Southwesterly 40 to 50mph, at times 60mph over higher mountains and particularly western tops.	
Effect of wind on you?	Deteriorating to make walking increasingly difficult on higher terrain, wind chill becoming significant.	Challenging conditions, balance often affected on higher terrain, frequent buffeting. Significant wind chill.	
How wet?	Rain later in west	Rain most of the day	
(Precipitation and its impact)	Dry much of morning, spots of rain developing, then later in the day risk of more persistent rain moving in from the west, setting in heavier toward evening.	Rain fairly persistent over western hills, starting as snow on the Munros, turning to sleet or rain up to higher summits, setting in heavier, particularly Skye & Torridon. Smaller amounts of rain toward east.	
Cloud on the hills?	Varied low cloud, filling in later	Increasingly extensive	
	Banks of cloud on some slopes in the morning, higher tops may be above cloud for a time. Cloud lifting onto the tops, some breaks toward east. Then thickening to become extensive, lowest near Skye.	Covering western mountains all day, may vary in the morning, some breaks possible, above 900m inland and east. Likely lowering to increasingly shroud hills, to lower slopes coasts south from Torridon.	
Chance of cloud free Munros?	50% dropping to 20%	30% dropping below 10%	
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Largely cloudy, a little sun through high cloud occasionally. Visibility good, but reducing later in rain.	Any weak patchy sun giving way to thickening cloud cover. Visibility initially good, mainly in east, becoming hazier; poor as rain sets in.	
How Cold? (at 900m)	1 to 3C. Wind chill feeling like -10C, nearer -15C as speeds increase.	0C rising to 2 or 3C. Wind chill feeling like -15C on the Munros.	
Freezing Level	Close to freezing some higher slopes above 900m at dawn; otherwise above the summits.	900-1000m early morning, rising just above the higher summits into afternoon.	

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 26 March, 2025

Westerly winds prevailing from midweek through to the weekend - often gale force over the mountains, particularly Scotland. Spells of rain, most persistent in western Scotland. Temperatures near or just above freezing on Scottish tops midweek, then widely chillier by Friday into the weekend - sub-zero on all hills above 800m, with showers of snow on hills and sometimes hail. An improving trend by Sunday into early next week high pressure starts to rebuild, bringing dry weather and lighter winds for most places.

Forecast issued at 15:40 on Monday, 24 March, 2025
