

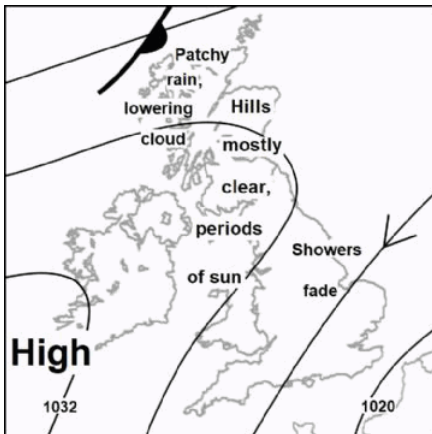
Peak District

General Summary for Tuesday, 21 November, 2023



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 21 November, 2023

Many places dry during the day with some sun. Light winds in morning for the Highlands, but will increase, gales into evening. Cloud thickening ahead of a warm front, some patchy rain developing for NW Scotland. Brief showers for eastern Pennines fade. Windy for England and Wales in morning.

Headline for Peak District

Wind easing. Varied cloud, an odd shower.

Detailed Forecast for Tuesday, 21 November, 2023

How windy? (On the summits)	Northeasterly 25mph at first, easing to 10-15mph by early afternoon.
Effect of wind on you?	Blustery morning with considerable wind chill and buffeting. Becoming small.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Residual patchy rain at first, fizzling out. A few residual pockets of rain for a time in the morning, brief light showers, but tending to fizzle out to leave dry conditions for the rest of the day.
Cloud on the hills?	Low cloud, slowly breaking up to clear. Areas of low cloud at varying heights from dawn, slowly lifting and breaking to mostly leave the hills clear into afternoon.
Chance of cloud free summits?	30% lifting to 70%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Mostly cloudy, a little weak sun may break through. Visibility becoming very good, but may be a murky start.
Temperature (at 600m)	5C, Feeling more like freezing in the brisk winds in the morning.
And in the valleys	5C at dawn, rising to 7 to 9C.

Peak District - Looking Ahead

	Wednesday 22 November	Thursday 23 November
How windy? (On the summits)	Westerly 25 to 40mph, speeds increasing during the day and into night.	Westerly 40 to 60mph, speeds likely peaking into the afternoon, then only lessening after dark.
Effect of wind on you?	Walking becoming increasingly strenuous over higher exposed terrain with marked wind chill.	Difficult conditions on higher terrain, any mobility becoming challenging. Significant wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Drizzly rain mostly west Periods of drizzle or patchy light rain, most common on western hills, may be fairly persistent for periods. Further south and east more often dry.	Drizzly rain mostly west Patchy drizzly rain, most frequent western hills. Mostly spots in the wind. Later in day, risk more persistent heavier rain moving in from the north, lasting an hour or so.
Cloud on the hills?	Risk becoming extensive Some or many hills may start clear, patchy mist possible in valleys. Increasing likelihood of low cloud filling in across the moors, lowest in western areas.	Mostly higher and western hills Banks of cloud often covering higher moors, especially western areas, mostly above 500m. Higher bases toward east.
Chance of cloud free summits?	40%	40%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Mostly cloudy, occasional sun toward east. Slight haze, visibility reduced in drizzle.	Mostly cloudy, glimpses of sun mainly east. Slight haze.
Temperature (at 600m)	5C rising 7C. Wind chill feels like -5C on tops.	8C, then likely to drop after dark. Wind chill feeling like -5C.
And in the valleys	4C at dawn, locally lower in sheltered spots. Rising to 10C.	Mild from dawn, 8C or above. Rising to 11 to 13C, highest in east. Then turning cooler into the night.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 22 November, 2023**

Wednesday into Thursday brings widespread gale force westerly winds over the mountains - increasingly severe. Very wet for western Scotland, particularly in northwest. Smaller amounts of rain further south and east. Colder air moves in from the northwest later Thursday into Friday, dipping below freezing on most high tops of Britain, showers with hail and snow falling to lower elevations in Scotland. Likely to stay chilly into the weekend, sub-zero on tops plus frost overnight into valleys and glens. Some local upland snowfalls possible, although high pressure nearby is likely to bring a fair amount of dry and bright weather plus wind speeds tending to ease.
