




The southernmost Pennines, covering the entire Peak District National Park, also extending north to hills accessed from Hebden Bridge, and including the hills immediately north of Manchester.

General Summary for Monday, 14 October, 2024



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 14 October, 2024

Sunshine and light wind on most mountain areas. However, in Wales, low cloud after overnight rain (mainly S Wales), and mist will lift only slowly from the north and west. A weakening front off the coast of NW Scotland will bring a little rain at first, and on Skye, extensive very low cloud.

Headline for Peak District

Dry; periods of sunshine. Light wind.

Detailed Forecast for Monday, 14 October, 2024

How windy? (On the summits)	Southeasterly, 15mph.	
Effect of wind on you?	Mostly negligible	
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain unlikely Small risk southern Peak District of a few pockets of drizzle at first.	
Cloud on the hills?	May form at times, most likely southern Peak District	
Chance of cloud free summits?	Some uncertainty as to whether cloud will have formed on higher areas overnight - this most likely southern Peak. The hills will probably clear by midday - possibly coming and coming above 500m southern Peak. 80%	
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Cloud to the south may well envelop at least the southern Peak District for periods; increasingly sunny north toward and north of M62.	
Temperature (at 600m)	3C, tending to rise slowly through the day.	
And in the valleys	Reaching 11C in the afternoon.

Varied: fairly small some areas, but expect considerable wind chill and walking arduous in places.	Southerly; tending to ease through day from 30 to 40mph after dawn toward 25mph by dusk. Very gusty. Considerable buffeting at times and wind chill where exposed. Sudden powerful gusts, sometimes on lower slopesr.
How wet?	Pockets of drizzly rain	Raining most of day
(Precipitation and its impact)	Drizzle here and there, possibly rain more persistent late in day.	Pulses of rain throughout day.
Cloud on the hills?	Persistent fog most or all higher areas	Higher areas persistently cloud covered
	Persistent fog above around 500m, locally forming nearer 400m.	Cloud base widely between 300m and 450m.
Chance of cloud free summits?	20%	10%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Widely dull and hazy.	Sunshine not expected. Frequently misty as visibility reduced by rain.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 15 October, 2024

Deteriorating over the next few days as wetter conditions, concentrated n most western mountains extends off the Atlantic. There will be bouts of upland gale, but only rarely on highest summits will temperatures drop below freezing point. Least rainfall is likely in the northern NW Highlands (north of Torridon).
