

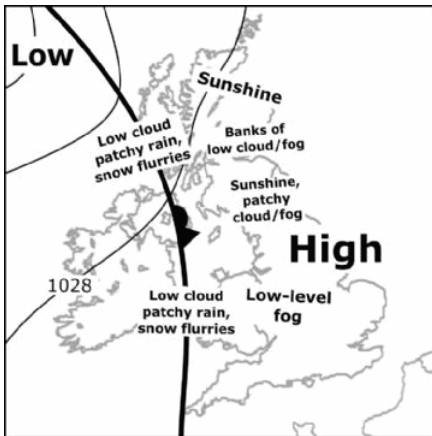
# Peak District

## General Summary for Saturday, 11 January, 2025



### British Mountain Summary:

**Based on forecast chart for noon 11 January, 2025**

Patchy snow flurries or light rain near western coasts slowly pushing inland, along with low cloud. High cloud thickening ahead of this. Local fog or banks of low cloud inland, some high tops above fog; sunshine best toward northeast Scotland. Increasing southerly wind.

### Headline for Peak District

Low-level fog - inversion, tops likely clear. Wind mostly light.

## Detailed Forecast for Saturday, 11 January, 2025

<b>How windy? (On the summits)</b>	Southerly 10-15mph, or less at first. Gradually tending to strengthen later in day, to 20mph some higher western areas.
<b>Effect of wind on you?</b>	<b>Small effect on walking much of the day, but feeling noticeably cold where breeze increases.</b>
<b>How wet?</b> (Precipitation and its impact)	<b>Dry overall</b> Dry very likely all day. From dusk, chance of brief snow flurries on westernmost areas.
<b>Cloud on the hills?</b>	<b>Fog lower terrain, hills clear above inversion</b> Possibly widely foggy lower slopes and valleys, some lingering particularly in the south all day. Hills likely poke above the fog, although up to dusk in the west, the fog layer may start to lift higher up.
<b>Chance of cloud free summits?</b>	<b>90% (above fog lower down).</b>
<b>Sunshine?</b> Air clarity (below cloud)	Mostly sunny on hills out of fog, high cloud increasingly weakens sun from the west. Excellent visibility out of fog lower down, staying hazy at least on low terrain.
<b>Temperature (at 600m)</b>	0 or -1C, little change all day (valleys colder much of day). Feeling like -5C with wind chill.
<b>And in the valleys</b>	-6C from dawn, rising to 0C afternoon, slightly higher on south-facing valley sides, but several degrees colder where fog lingers.

## Peak District - Looking Ahead

<b>How windy? (On the summits)</b>	Southwesterly 15-25mph. Gusty in places.	Southwesterly 25 to 40mph, may strengthen further during day.
<b>Effect of wind on you?</b>	<b>Fairly small, but feeling blustery over exposed terrain, may start to affect comfortable walking.</b>	<b>Will impede comfortable walking, increasingly strenuous on exposed terrain. Considerable wind chill.</b>
<b>How wet?</b> (Precipitation and its impact)	<b>Precipitation rare if any</b> Possibility of light rain spots from high cloud though mostly dry.	<b>A little rain mostly north</b> Occasional rain mostly hills near and north from the M62. Very little elsewhere.
<b>Cloud on the hills?</b>	<b>Varied fog banks</b>  Some fog patches early in the day, may lift upslope across the hills. Low clouds come and go across most hills for periods, locally clearing at times, mainly in east.	<b>Extensive north &amp; west</b>  Covering higher terrain most or all day, lowest and most persistent western areas, particularly Lancashire, to lower slopes. Above hills for periods eastern moors.
<b>Chance of cloud free summits?</b>	<b>40%</b>	<b>20%</b>
<b>Sunshine?</b> Air clarity (below cloud)	When out of low cloud, hazy sunshine through high cloud. Visibility mostly poor, occasionally good.	Glimpses of weak sun east, otherwise cloudy. Visibility good if dry, but mostly hazy.
<b>Temperature (at 600m)</b>  <b>And in the valleys</b>	1C. Lower terrain and some sheltered valleys staying at or below 0C. Feeling as cold as -10C with wind chill. -5C in shelter at dawn, rising to +1C, possibly higher onward into evening. Some thawing beginning some slopes.	5C, small change with height; locally warmer some eastern slopes. In the wind, feeling as cold as -5C. Possible slight frost some sheltered valleys at dawn. Max 5 to 7C.

**Planning Outlook****All mountain areas of Britain from Sunday, 12 January, 2025**

Terrain still widely frozen and snow covered this weekend, but by Sunday the air temperature lifting above freezing at all elevations - a thaw commencing, more rapid into Monday with some heavy rain in the west. A much milder week ahead, highest Scottish tops only rarely close to freezing point. Southwesterly winds frequently gale force over the Highlands, bringing low cloud particularly to western mountains and occasional rain. High pressure over England & Wales brings quieter conditions here much of the week, some low-level cloud and fog. Changeable west-southwesterlies likely prevail into second half of January, with cycles of freeze and thaw and risk of more frequent precipitation.
