




The southernmost Pennines, covering the entire Peak District National Park, also extending north to hills accessed from Hebden Bridge, and including the hills immediately north of Manchester.

## General Summary for Sunday, 19 January, 2025



# British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 19 January, 2025

Banks of low cloud over the southern Highlands and up the west coast to Skye, some patchy coastal drizzle. Many higher Scottish tops poking out above the cloud sheet. The northern Highlands sunnier. England & Wales sees fairly extensive low cloud, with only highest tops possibly poking just above cloud. Wind fairly light.

#### **Headline for Peak District**

Fairly extensive hill fog most likely up to tops. Chilly.

### **Detailed Forecast for Sunday, 19 January, 2025**

How windy? (On the summits)	Southerly 10-20mph at first. Turning southwesterly and rising slightly through the day.	
Effect of wind on you?	Minimal effects through much of the day.	
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Very little or no precipitation Possible snow grains falling briefly on some slopes.	
Cloud on the hills?	Mostly foggy hills: occasional breaks on highest ground	
	Early fog banks valleys and lower hills soon rising onto higher terrain. Cloud fairly extensive across all terrain perhaps much of the day, though occasional breaks may occur.	
Chance of cloud free summits?	20%	
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Weak sunshine possible through fog on higher ground. Highest ground may experience full sun before fog rises.  Visibility poor.	
Temperature (at 600m)	0 to -2C, may lift slightly if out of fog (little variation with height).	
And in the valleys	-2C, some valleys locally cooler where skies are clear overnight; staying near 1C if in fog all day, locally up to 3C if clear.

#### **Planning Outlook**

#### All mountain areas of Britain from Monday, 20 January, 2025

Gradually lowering pressure and falling temperature during the days ahead - mountain tops dropping sub-zero widely into midweek. Some areas of precipitation, most frequent in western Scotland early in the new week, falling as snow over higher terrain, although total amounts generally small. Blustery over some higher slopes with marked wind chill, but speeds relatively light for many into midweek. Winds are likely to strengthen toward next weekend as deeper areas of low pressure over the Atlantic approach. Late January is likely to see more frequent precipitation and periods of gales or possibly stormy winds at times; fluctuating temperatures and freeze-thaw cycles.
