

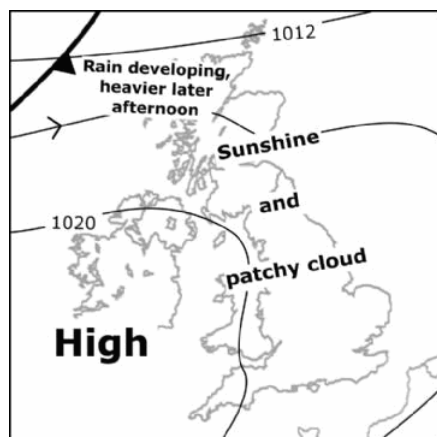
Peak District

General Summary for Monday, 24 March, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 24 March, 2025

Westerly winds strengthening, reaching gale force over tops in the Highlands. Rain moves into northwest Scotland, setting in heavier during afternoon; patchy rain extending southeastwards later. Dry all daylight for England, Wales and southern Scotland, with good amounts of sunshine.

Headline for Peak District

Wind increasing afternoon. Dry with sun and broken cloud.

Detailed Forecast for Monday, 24 March, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Northerly 20mph from dawn, easing into middle of day to 15mph or less; turning westerly afternoon, by dusk 20-25mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Mostly small
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain very unlikely Chance an isolated pocket of drizzle easternmost hills early morning.
Cloud on the hills?	Early patchy cloud all clearing Patchy cloud on some hills early morning, mainly eastern moors above 400-500m. Will all thin and break up by middle of day.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Rising above 90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Patchwork of sun developing after a dull start at least in the east. Increasingly excellent visibility.
Temperature (at 600m)	3C rising to 6C.
And in the valleys	Slight frost sheltered valleys at dawn. Reaching 10 to 12C by early afternoon.

Peak District - Looking Ahead

	Tuesday 25 March	Wednesday 26 March
How windy? (On the summits)	Northwesterly 20 to 25mph.	Southwesterly, strengthening 20 to 30mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small, but feeling blustery and cool where exposed around higher tops.	Becoming increasingly blustery, starting to affect comfortable walking on exposed higher areas.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	A little rain in morning Patchy rain and drizzle from before dawn into the early morning, mainly western hills, clearing southwards to become generally dry by middle of the day.	Rain not expected
Cloud on the hills?	Covering hills for a few hours, clearing Shrouding higher moors from dawn, above 400-500m western areas, higher cloud base eastwards. Lifting above the hills by middle of day.	Hills mostly clear Mist patches some valleys and lower hill slopes at first, briefly may drift upslope, but all dispersing.
Chance of cloud free summits?	20% rising to 80%	90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Cloudy morning, sun breaking through in afternoon, later increasingly sunny. Visibility reduced in rain, then very good.	Mostly sunny, some thin high cloud. Visibility very good.
Temperature (at 600m)	5 to 8C. Wind chill feeling close to freezing.	5 to 8C. Wind chill feeling near -5C as speeds increase.
And in the valleys	7C from dawn, rising to 13C afternoon.	Close to freezing some sheltered valleys at dawn. Rising to 12 to 14C afternoon.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 25 March, 2025**

A mixed westerly regime for the next week to ten days - fronts coming in from the west bringing spells of rain, interspersed with better days under ridges of high pressure. Rain most frequent in western Scotland. Frequently windy, periods of gale force wind over the mountains. Temperature varied, sometimes just below freezing on higher Scottish summits, with some showers of snow at times on the Munros - chillier more widely by Friday into Saturday as wind turns northwesterly for a time.
