

General Summary for Thursday, 24 April, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 24 April, 2025

Low cloud from the North Sea covering all but some western mountains widely from dawn will gradually clear as it retreats eastwards into the middle of the day, some patches may remain on eastern slopes. Sunny most or all day western coasts. Small risk an afternoon shower.

Headline for Peak District

Sunshine increasingly extensive through morning. Light wind.

Detailed Forecast for Thursday, 24 April, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Easterly 10mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Small
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain unlikely
Cloud on the hills?	Soon clearing Risk of a cloud sheet above 500m for a few hours from dawn before all dispersing.
Chance of cloud free summits?	30% rising to become almost certain
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Cloud breaking to give patchwork of sunshine. Misty start in places; visibility then excellent.
Temperature (at 600m)	5C rising to 9C.
And in the valleys	3C at dawn, grass frost some valleys. Rising to 15C afternoon.

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Peak District - Looking Ahead

	Friday 25 April	Saturday 26 April
How windy? (On the summits)	Southeasterly 10-15mph, up to 20mph western areas into afternoon.	Southerly 10 to 15mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small	Small
How wet?	Likely dry all daytime	A little rain, risk a showery burst
(Precipitation and its impact)	Dry most likely until after dark, then some patchy rain develops from west into night.	Risk patchy light rain or drizzle in the morning. Possibly an odd burst of rain almost anywhere into afternoon.
Cloud on the hills?	Early fog lifts above tops	Patchy cloud, lifting above tops
	Variable fog banks from dawn, particularly eastern moors, lifts and breaks during the morning for mostly cloud-free hills by middle of day into afternoon.	Risk of cloud banks around some slopes in the morning, lifting toward then above higher tops during middle of day.
Chance of cloud free summits?	50%, rising to 80%	70%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Weakening sun through high cloud. Excellent visibility.	Glimpses of sun. Visibility good, but may be hazy or misty in places in the morning.
Temperature (at 600m)	6C, rising to 9C	8C
And in the valleys	4C at dawn, rising to 15C afternoon.	9C from dawn, rising to 15C afternoon.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Friday, 25 April, 2025

Weak fronts will encroach from the Atlantic by Friday into the weekend, bringing more humid air, with low cloud and patchy rain or drizzle, local showery bursts. Possibility of more persistent rain in western Scotland by Sunday with stronger southwesterly winds for a time. Generally mild, or increasingly warm into early next week as southerly air prevails. High pressure rebuilding with a good deal of dry and sunny weather expected next week into the start of May.
