

General Summary for Saturday, 26 April, 2025



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 26 April, 2025

Rain and low cloud will reach mainly western mountains ahead of a weakening front. Generally a slow improvement through the day as the rain increasingly fizzles out and away from south facing coastal hills, cloud base rises. Blustery Scottish Highlands, particularly NW.

Headline for Peak District

Light wind. Risk of the odd burst of rain.

Detailed Forecast for Saturday, 26 April, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Southerly 10 to perhaps 15mph.	
Effect of wind on you?	Negligible	
How wet?	Chance of a burst of rain	
(Precipitation and its impact)	Rain and drizzle rarely - possibly isolated heavy bursts afternoon.	
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive on higher areas morning; mostly or all clearing	
	Cloud base generally 500 to 700m morning. There will be a trend toward higher bases through the day when higher summits very likely to clear.	
Chance of cloud free summits?	20% rising to 80%	
Sunshine?	Occasional sun.	
Air clarity (below cloud)	Misty in rain, but otherwise visibility mostly excellent.	
Temperature (at 600m)	8 rising to 12C	
And in the valleys	14 to 16C, warmest eastern dales

How windy? (On the summits)	South to southwesterly, 20mph.	Southwesterly between 10 and possibly 20mph northern Pennines.
Effect of wind on you?	Small.	Small.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain not expected	Rain not expected
Cloud on the hills?	All clearing Fog may be widespread some lower slopes after dawn. Higher tops probably above the fog, which will all disperse by about mid morning.	Little if any
Chance of cloud free summits?	Greater than 90% by late morning	90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Extensive or unbroken sunshine, but a haze, and risk fog some valleys and lower areas for a few hours from dawn.	Sunshine extensive or unbroken and visibility excellent.
Temperature (at 600m)	11C.	10 rising to 14C
And in the valleys	16 to 18C in the afternoon.	18 to 21C in the afternoon.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Sunday, 27 April, 2025

Much of Britain will be fine and sunny through much of next week. Temperatures, after being very warm, could well drop markedly on Thursday (Scotland) or Friday (England and Wales). Westerly winds in N Scotland may well maintain more mixed weather here, with occasional rain and cloud across higher summits.
