




The southernmost Pennines, covering the entire Peak District National Park, also extending north to hills accessed from Hebden Bridge, and including the hills immediately north of Manchester.

General Summary for Monday, 5 May, 2025



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 5 May, 2025

Fine with light winds for the Highlands, sunshine and the mountains largely free of cloud; starting chilly, warming up into afternoon. Chilly northeasterly winds England & Wales in the morning, easing gradually; fairly cloudy skies south & east Pennines, locally a shower.

Headline for Peak District

Chilly breeze on hills. Often cloudy skies.

Detailed Forecast for Monday, 5 May, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Northeasterly 20mph up to 25-30mph on exposed tops for a few hours early morning. Easing a little to 15mph afternoon, or less by dusk.	
Effect of wind on you?	Blustery and feeling distinctly chilly where exposed on tops in the morning, becoming fairly small during afternoon.	
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Little or no rain Risk of an odd spot of rain in the wind, possibly an isolated brief shower, mainly areas toward the northeast Peak District.	
Cloud on the hills?	Cloud above hills	
Chance of cloud free summits?	Almost certain	
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Fairly cloudy, some sun occasionally, mostly western areas. Excellent visibility.	
Temperature (at 600m)	1C from dawn; rising to 7C afternoon. In the breeze feeling as cold as -5C at first, around +3C mid-afternoon.	
And in the valleys	Frost some valleys at dawn; temperatures rising to 12 to 14C in the afternoon.

How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Mostly northerly 10mph or less. Negligible	Northeasterly 10-15mph, increasing afternoon to 20mph, possibly 25mph by evening on exposed higher areas. Fairly small, but feeling increasingly chilly as the breeze freshens.
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How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	No rain	No rain
Cloud on the hills?	Not expected	Not expected
Chance of cloud free summits?	Practically certain	Above 90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Extensive or unbroken sunshine. Excellent visibility, although slight haze, particularly morning.	Sun and high cloud, patchy fair-weather cloud filling in for a time afternoon. Visibility excellent.
Temperature (at 600m)	5C at dawn; rising as high as 12C afternoon.	5C at dawn, rising to 11C afternoon, though eastern moors slightly cooler, later in the breeze feeling like 4C.
And in the valleys	At dawn slight frost some valleys. Will rise to around 16C in the afternoon.	Slight frost at dawn in valleys and some sheltered higher terrain. Rising to 14 to 16C afternoon.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 6 May, 2025

High pressure continues to reside over the British Isles during the week ahead, maintaining generally dry conditions, low risk of an isolated afternoon shower. Winds mostly light, direction variable. Chilly nights with frost in valleys and sheltered higher terrain. Becoming pleasantly warm into the afternoons. Sunshine and variable cloud, at times covering the sky, but generally above the mountain tops with excellent visibility. Very dry ground conditions almost everywhere, beware high risk of fire.
