

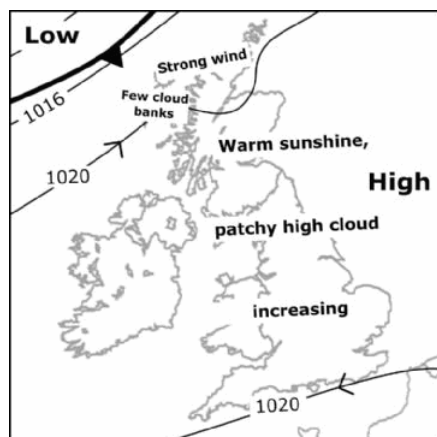
Peak District

General Summary for Friday, 9 May, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 9 May, 2025

In Scotland, thin mist in the glens and isolated cloud caps over highest tops at dawn will soon clear for cloud free hills. Isolated low morning fog in eastern valleys of England and Wales as well, also soon clearing. A patchwork of sun for most as high fair-weather cloud builds, feeling warm in direct sun. Mostly light winds.

Headline for Peak District

Dry with patchy high cloud; feeling warm in the sun

Detailed Forecast for Friday, 9 May, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Variable direction 10mph or less, becoming generally southerly after noon. An increase in the south around dusk, up to 20mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Negligible
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	No rain
Cloud on the hills?	Dawn fog clearing for cloud-free hills Local banks of low valley fog at dawn in the east. Fog may rise slightly soon after daybreak, briefly covering some high tops, though soon dissipating for cloud-free hills.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Above 90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Sunshine with patchy fair-weather cloud building through the afternoon. Visibility excellent, a slight haze in the morning.
Temperature (at 600m)	5 or 6C, rising to 13C by afternoon.
And in the valleys	5C or locally cooler at dawn, rising to 17C afternoon.

How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	No rain	Rain unlikely
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Not expected Nearly certain	Not expected Above 90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Strong sunshine, a patchwork of cloud building after noon. Some haze at dawn, visibility becoming excellent.	Mostly sunny, some high cloud around. A patchwork of fair weather cloud builds after noon. Visibility excellent, some haze early.
Temperature (at 600m) And in the valleys	8C from dawn, rising to 14C afternoon. 5C or locally cooler at dawn. Rising toward 18C during afternoon.	9C rising to 15C 6C at dawn, rising to 19C

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Saturday, 10 May, 2025

Low pressure south and west of the British Isles will facilitate bursts of rain into Wales though the weekend into next week. High pressure to the east keeps most eastern areas settled during this time. The continental wind track will keep most cloud above the summits, with eastern areas often sunny. Generally settled conditions prevail next week as high pressure reestablishes just north of the British Isles, though odd bursts of rain come and go in Wales. A mix of cloud and sun with light winds, generally easterly though variable. Slight frosts at dawn in sheltered spots, mostly warm by day. Very dry ground conditions, beware high risk of fire.
