

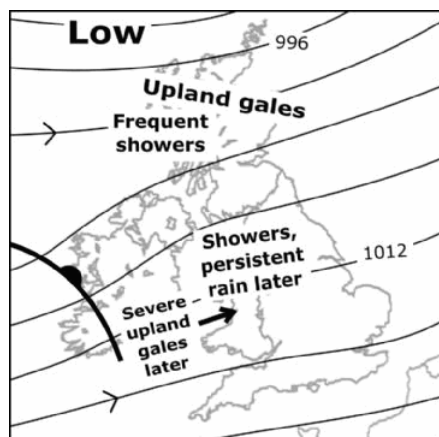
Peak District

General Summary for Monday, 26 May, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 26 May, 2025

Gales widespread over the mountains, during afternoon in Wales strengthening to become increasingly severe on tops. Showery bursts, most frequent in the west, hail and isolated thunder. Merging into constant and heavier rain for England, Wales and southwest Scotland later.

Headline for Peak District

Windy; showery rain mostly into afternoon, wetter by evening.

Detailed Forecast for Monday, 26 May, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Southwesterly 25 to 35mph, strengthening later afternoon into evening to 40-45mph, up to dusk 50mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Very blustery, walking uncomfortable in places where exposed on higher tops and edges. Deteriorating to become arduous later difficult. Considerable wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Passing showers, then wetter later Occasional brief showers, mostly western areas in the morning, more widespread into the afternoon. More persistent rain later afternoon in west and toward evening more widely, turning heavier.
Cloud on the hills?	Tops often clear, lowering later Cloud mostly above the hills, but some banks may drift over higher slopes in the morning, mainly western areas. Later in day lowering across higher slopes as rain develops.
Chance of cloud free summits?	80% later 40%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Intermittent sunshine. Visibility often very good, briefly poor in showers.
Temperature (at 600m)	4C rising to 8C. Wind chill feeling like -5C on tops in morning, -2C by afternoon.
And in the valleys	7C at dawn, rising to 14C afternoon.

Peak District - Looking Ahead

	Tuesday 27 May	Wednesday 28 May
How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	West to southwesterly 20-30mph in morning, easing to 15-20mph. Risk SW'ly 40-50mph by evening. Blustery on high tops in morning, but improving for a time. Possibly deteriorating later in day, risk of upland gales.	West to northwesterly 20 to 25mph, risk 30-35mph for a few hours from dawn. Starting to affect comfortable walking where exposed on higher terrain. More blustery at first. Marked wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain developing, heavy later Largely dry morning, some rain spots developing with time - some uncertainty of timing - but threat of rain developing from the southwest afternoon, setting in heavier with time.	Showers mostly early in day Showery rain from overnight may continue into the morning before clearing, leaving brief passing light showers. Into night, risk of heavy rain moving in from the west.
Cloud on the hills?	Little if any, then lowering in rain Possible patches on higher western slopes at first, but soon most hills clear, for several hours, possibly until late in day. Later as rain develops, cloud lowering to blanket hills to increasingly low levels.	Little if any Possible patches briefly grazing some higher western slopes in the morning, but soon all cloud above the hills.
Chance of cloud free summits?	90%, later 10%	Above 90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Glimpses of sun giving way as high cloud builds, becoming overcast. Visibility very good, then poor later as rain develops.	Broken cloud and sun; cloud filling in for periods. Visibility very good.
Temperature (at 600m) And in the valleys	6C rising to 10C. 7C at dawn, rising to 15C afternoon, only slight fall into evening.	7C rising to 11C. Wind chill feeling near 0C in morning, or colder at first. 9C at dawn, rising to 16C afternoon.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 27 May, 2025**

Changeable conditions this week with low pressure and frontal systems passing west to east. West to southwesterly winds prevailing, speeds varied, but gale force for periods on the mountains. Spells of rain and showers, some periods of sustained heavier rain. Cloud often shrouding higher terrain. Better toward the east and northeast of Scotland. Generally rather cool for Scotland, near freezing on highest summits early in week, then a little milder, or warmer further south over England & Wales. Some improvements in conditions especially in southern areas as pressure builds at times, but mixed westerlies are likely to prevail into the start of June.

Forecast issued at 16:00 on Sunday, 25 May, 2025
