

General Summary for Friday, 30 May, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 30 May, 2025

Morning rain, locally heavy, clearing to leave localised drizzly showers. Extensive cloud remaining near the west coast and over much of Wales and the Peak District. Winds soon light in Scotland, but higher wind speeds over England and Wales; tending to ease a little through the day. Feeling cool in the Highlands.

Headline for Peak District

Patchy rain on and off; wind easing slightly

Detailed Forecast for Friday, 30 May, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	West or southwesterly 25-35mph in the morning, gradually easing to 20-25mph in the afternoon to evening.		
Effect of wind on you?	Comfortable walking starting to be affected; more challenging for a few hours in morning. Notable wind chill.		
How wet?	Rain on and off		
(Precipitation and its impact)	Areas of rain and drizzle come and go through the day, some may linger for a time, particularly in the west. Becoming largely dry by mid-afternoon onwards.		
Cloud on the hills?	Intermittent over high terrain		
	Extensive at dawn, lowest in western areas. Bases lift through the morning and becoming patchy, intermittently above the hills. Bases return to high terrain in rain.		
Chance of cloud free summits?	60%		
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Occasional sun, but extensive cloudy periods. Very good visibility where out of cloud/rain.		
Temperature (at	rature (at 10C rising to 13C		
600m)	Feeling like 3C in the strongest winds.		
And in the valleys	12C at dawn, rising to 17C		

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Peak District - Looking Ahead

	Saturday 31 May	Sunday 1 June
How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Southerly 15 to 25mph, tending to strengthen during the day and into the night. Fairly small, but may start to feel noticeable when walking on exposed tops.	Low confidence in forecast. Westerly 30 to 45mph, chance of it being a touch lighter but details uncertain. Balance affected and on highest ground foot may be blown to the side when stepping. Marked wind chill.
How wet?	Possible patchy rain	Risk of drizzly rain in western Dales
(Precipitation and its impact)	Often dry, but risk patches of rain or drizzle now and again, perhaps an odd heavier shower.	Patches of light rain or drizzle may come in over the Cheshire Plain, most likely in the western Peak District. Eastern regions remaining mostly dry all day.
Cloud on the hills?	Lifting and clearing	High ground shrouded in the west
	Patchy low cloud banks around some hill slopes in the morning, lifting and breaking above the tops by middle of day.	Cloud forming widely above 400-500m from dawn. Very likely to improve as cloud clears above the hills by midday or early afternoon
Chance of cloud free summits?	50% rising above 90%	90% by mid afternoon
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Fairly cloudy with some sun breaking through. Visibility mostly very good, early mist clearing.	Fairly widespread sunshine when dry. Good visibility.
Temperature (at 600m)	11 to 15C.	10C. Feeling around freezing the higher wind.
And in the valleys	10C at dawn, rising to a fairly humid 21C by afternoon.	8C in the morning, rising as high as 16C in the afternoon.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Saturday, 31 May, 2025

A changeable, unsettled outlook this weekend and the first week of June as low pressure and frontal systems pass west to east. West to southwesterly winds prevailing, speeds varied, but gale force for periods on the mountains. Spells of rain and showers, some periods of sustained heavier rain mixed with thundery showers at times. Cloud often shrouding higher terrain. Brief ridges of high pressure afford short-lived windows of drier and clearer weather, likely on Monday. Temperatures near average, although often cooler northern Scotland, feeling chilly where exposed to strong winds.

Forecast issued at 16:30 on Thursday, 29 May, 2025
