




The southernmost Pennines, covering the entire Peak District National Park, also extending north to hills accessed from Hebden Bridge, and including the hills immediately north of Manchester.

General Summary for Wednesday, 4 June, 2025



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 4 June, 2025

Cold: showers (very frequent west) of hail and on higher slopes snow and gale force upland winds. Southward into England and Wales, a little less cold, progressively fewer showers and decreasingly windy.

Headline for Peak District

A few showers; fairly light wind.

Detailed Forecast for Wednesday, 4 June, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Southwesterly 20 to intermittently 25mph.	
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small.	
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Scattered showers Extensively dry, but a passing shower here and there afternoon.	
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud	Extensively cloud free A few early patches may cover some tops. Otherwise, hills free of fog. Greater than 90%	
free summits? Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Patchwork of sunshine. Visibility very good or excellent.	
Temperature (at 600m)	6C rising to 10C.

How windy? (On the summits)	Southwesterly 20mph.	West backing southwesterly 15 to 20mph. May strengthen to 25mph evening.
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small.	Mostly small.
How wet?	Risk rain on and off for a few hours	Confidence low: Risk showery rain
(Precipitation and its impact)	A little rain, perhaps on and off for a few hours, probably clearing though afternoon.	Largely dry before showers develop, which may become widespread and merge to give intermittent steady rain late in day.
Cloud on the hills?	Coming and going: perhaps extensive for a few hours in rain	Clearing most, perhaps nearly all summits; may lower again later in day
	Low confidence: In rain fog forming, perhaps extensively above 400 or 500m, but perhaps near or below 300m at times western slopes. At first and again later in the day, the hills largely cloud free.	Cloud base rising; by late morning cloud above the summits. May lower toward/during evening to shroud higher areas.
Chance of cloud free summits?	10%	80% by midday; dropping to 30% evening
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Sunshine from time to time, although probably extensive cloud for much of the day. Mostly very good visibility, but poor in rain.	Patches of sunshine, mainly east Wales, before high level cloud slowly thickens. Excellent visibility.
Temperature (at 600m)	10C.	6C rising to 10C.
And in the valleys	Around 14C	13 to 16C in the afternoon.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Thursday, 5 June, 2025

Remaining chilly (intermittently near freezing point highest Scottish summits) for the remainder of the week - and probably most of next week. Rainfall and low cloud will remain frequent across particularly western mountains. Often windy higher summits - although mostly speeds below gale force.
