




The southernmost Pennines, covering the entire Peak District National Park, also extending north to hills accessed from Hebden Bridge, and including the hills immediately north of Manchester.

General Summary for Monday, 16 June, 2025



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 16 June, 2025

A front draped over the Highlands brings low cloud and drizzly rain to western areas, heavier rain pushing northwards in the afternoon. Southwesterly winds will strengthen later in Scotland, becoming gales on higher mountains by evening. Dry with sunny spells and cloud clearing the tops in England & Wales.

Headline for Peak District

Light-moderate breeze. Sun and broken cloud, quite warm.

Detailed Forecast for Monday, 16 June, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	West then southwesterly, 15-20mph, increasing a little into evening and night, to around 25mph.	
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small most of daytime.	
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain not expected	
Cloud on the hills?	Soon clearing	
	Any early cloud banks on upper slopes, mostly toward west, all dispersing or lifting above hills by mid-morning.	
Chance of cloud free summits?	Soon above 90%	
Sunshine?	Patchwork of cloud and sun.	
Air clarity (below cloud)	Very good visibility.	
Temperature (at 600m)	12C rising to 16C.	
And in the valleys	12C at dawn, rising to 20 to 22C in afternoon.

How windy? (On the summits)	West to southwesterly 20mph, up to 25 or 30mph for a time early in day.	Westerly 15mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small, but feeling breezy over higher terrain, may start to affect comfortable walking early morning.	Fairly small
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Possible light rain northwest A weakening front coming in from north may bring drizzly showers to western hills, mainly areas north from Bleaklow during afternoon.	Rain not expected
Cloud on the hills?	Little if any Generally above the hills, some patchy cloud may drift onto western higher slopes if rain develops.	Little or none Any early misty cloud on some slopes soon all clearing.
Chance of cloud free summits?	90%	90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Glimpses of sun best in east, clouding over for a time at least further north/west. Visibility very good, hazier in west.	Mostly sunny, some fair-weather cloud. Visibility very good.
Temperature (at 600m)	12 to 14C.	12C rising to 16C.
And in the valleys	11C from dawn, rising toward 20C afternoon, quite humid.	13C at dawn, rising to 21C afternoon.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 17 June, 2025

Humid southwesterly winds early this week brings low cloud and spells of drizzly rain to western hills. High pressure to the south will tend to expand northwards during midweek, with dry conditions and warm air for all regions, sunshine and fair-weather cloud. Winds becoming light south to southeasterlies later in the week. Uncertainty by next weekend into early the following week, a risk of some rain or showers returning as pressure tends to fall.
