

General Summary for Monday, 23 June, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 23 June, 2025

Windy for all regions, gale-force westerlies on higher mountains. Much cooler air than recently, feeling distinctly chilly where exposed on hills. Showery rain most frequent western Scotland and cloud often capping tops. Light showers England & Wales, drier spells.

Headline for Peak District

Cool and windy. Brief light showers.

Detailed Forecast for Monday, 23 June, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Westerly 25 to 30mph. Breezy, affecting ease of walking where exposed on higher moors, more strenuous at times. Marked wind chill.	
Effect of wind on you?		
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Occasional light rain Patchy light showers and drizzle mostly western moors. Steadier rain from dusk into night.	
Cloud on the hills?	Lifting above hills Occasional cloud banks drifting over higher slopes, mainly western areas in the morning.	
Chance of cloud free summits?	80%	
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Fairly cloudy, occasional sun, more often toward east. Visibility very good.	
Temperature (at 600m)	7C from dawn, rising to 12C. Feeling near freezing in wind at first, around 5C afternoon.	
And in the valleys	12C at dawn, rising to 18C afternoon.	

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Peak District - Looking Ahead

	Tuesday 24 June	Wednesday 25 June
How windy? (On the summits)	West to southwesterly 20 to 30mph.	South to southwesterly 15 to 20mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Blustery, affecting comfortable walking where exposed on higher moors, gusty near some edges. Marked wind chill.	Fairly small.
How wet?	A little rain mostly northwest	Little or no rain most of day
(Precipitation and its impact)	Occasional light rain or drizzle, mostly areas toward north of Peak District and into Lancashire Pennines.	Occasional drizzly showers, mostly western hills. Toward evening, risk some more persistent rain, again mainly toward west.
Cloud on the hills?	Fairly extensive, lifting southern areas	Lifting above most or all tops
	Covering hills in morning above 300-500m, lowest west. Lifting to upper slopes, but may persist north from Kinder Scout.	Covering some higher moors in the morning, most likely further west and southwest. Most cloud tending to rise above the hills, but lowering if rain develops later.
Chance of cloud free summits?	30%	70%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Fairly cloudy, a little sun mainly east. Visibility good.	Glimpses of sun, mainly toward east. Visibility very good.
Temperature (at 600m)	12 to 14C. Feeling nearer 5C in the wind.	12C rising to 16C.
And in the valleys	13C at dawn, rising to 19C afternoon.	13C at dawn, rising to 21C afternoon.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 24 June, 2025

West to southwesterly winds prevail this week and a series of frontal systems come in from the Atlantic. Rain and drizzle most frequent in west with low cloud often covering hills. Higher cloud bases and drier further eastwards. Much cooler than recently, temperatures nearer average, or lower at times in Scotland. Often windy, but by later in the week, risk of more extensive upland gales and some heavier rain as deeper areas of low pressure likely move in.

Forecast issued at 16:00 on Sunday, 22 June, 2025
