# **Peak District**






The southernmost Pennines, covering the entire Peak District National Park, also extending north to hills accessed from Hebden Bridge, and including the hills immediately north of Manchester.

# General Summary for Tuesday, 24 June, 2025



# British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 24 June, 2025

Frequent rain/drizzle onto most west coastal slopes, steadier rain for a time in the morning slipping east. High terrain mostly foggy, down to lower slopes in places along west coasts; best of breaks east Scotland and North Pennines. Blustery for most with risk of gales high terrain of England and north Wales.

#### **Headline for Peak District**

Patchy or frequent rain northwest slopes; very blustery for a time

### Detailed Forecast for Tuesday, 24 June, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Westerly 25 to 30mph. Strongest sustained winds during afternoon, risk reaching up to 40mph on northern hills.	
Effect of wind on you?	Blustery, affecting comfortable walking where exposed on higher moors, gusty near some edges. Strongest winds afternoon making walking arduous. Marked wind chill.	
How wet?	Widely rainy early, then drizzly showers northern areas	
(Precipitation and its impact)	Rain fairly persistent for several hours in the morning over western slopes, regularly pushing east. Drizzly showers continue moving in from the west afternoon toward north of Peak District and into Lancashire Pennines.	
Cloud on the hills?	Fairly extensive, lifting southern areas	
	Covering hills in morning above 300-500m, lowest west. Lifting to upper slopes, but may persist north from Kinder Scout.	
Chance of cloud free summits?	30%	
Sunshine?	Fairly cloudy, some glimpses of sun, best east. Visibility excellent below cloud and away from rain (primarily east).	
Air clarity (below cloud)		
Temperature (at	12C, rising to 14 or 15C.	
600m)	Feeling nearer 5C in the wind.	
And in the valleys	13C at dawn, rising to 18C afternoon.

How windy? (On the summits)  Effect of wind on you?	Westerly, shifting southwesterly, 15 to 20mph. Breezes up to 25mph early morning.  Fairly small.	Westerly 25-30mph. Shifting southwesterly into night and increasing to 40mph+.  Walking impeded in strongest winds, becoming arduous into evening.  Marked wind chill.
How wet?	Little or no rain most of day	Rain early, then dry
(Precipitation and its impact)	Occasional drizzly showers, mostly western hills. Toward evening, risk some more persistent rain, again mainly toward west.	Rain on and off around and after dawn for a few hours, then substantially dry.
Cloud on the hills?	Lifting above most or all tops	Fairly extensive early, becoming cloud-free
	Covering some higher moors in the morning, most likely further west and southwest. Most cloud tending to rise above the hills, but lowering if rain develops later.	Quite extensive over high terrain at dawn, down to lowest slopes in the west. Breaking and lifting through morning for cloud-free hills.
Chance of cloud free summits?	70%	Becoming above 90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Glimpses of sun, mainly toward east. Visibility very good.	Gradually becoming mostly sunny through morning. Excellent visibility.
Temperature (at 600m)	12C rising to 16C.	13C at daybreak, cooling to 11C late morning/afternoon. Feeling just above freezing in wind.
And in the valleys	13C at dawn, rising to 21C afternoon.	13C at dawn, rising to 16C for a time. Western-aspect valleys likely variable between these temperatures afternoon.

### **Planning Outlook**

### All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 25 June, 2025

West to southwesterly winds prevail this week and a series of frontal systems come in from the Atlantic. Rain and drizzle most frequent in west with low cloud often covering hills, typically most extensive in Scotland. Higher cloud bases and drier further eastwards. Temperatures near average, or lower at times in Scotland. Often windy, risk of more extensive upland gales and some heavier rain as deeper areas of low pressure likely move in later in the week. Some indication of a brief settled spell into the weekend and rising temperatures, though northwest Scotland remaining at risk of frontal weather systems.
