


# Peak District

## General Summary for Wednesday, 2 July, 2025



### British Mountain Summary:

#### Based on forecast chart for noon 2 July, 2025

Localised heavy bursts of rain for eastern Scotland & northern England early in the day, clearing eastwards, but over Cairngorms in particular, increasing risk afternoon of slow-moving heavy downpours forming, locally a thunderstorm. Western Scotland largely dry; increasingly sunny all western areas afternoon. Fresher for all.

### Headline for Peak District

Brief showers clearing. Broken cloud and sun. Light wind.

## Detailed Forecast for Wednesday, 2 July, 2025

<b>How windy? (On the summits)</b>	Variable or northwesterly 10 to 15mph, increasing to 20mph afternoon.
<b>Effect of wind on you?</b>	<b>Mostly small</b>
<b>How wet?</b> (Precipitation and its impact)	<b>Largely dry, chance early showers</b> Possible early spots from high cloud. Chance of local showers in morning, moving east and all clearing.
<b>Cloud on the hills?</b>	<b>Any early cloud clearing</b> Patchy cloud banks on some higher slopes at first and if showers occur in morning, but soon lifting above the hills.
<b>Chance of cloud free summits?</b>	<b>Above 90% by mid-morning.</b>
<b>Sunshine?</b> Air clarity (below cloud)	Areas of high cloud often cover the sky in morning, sunny spells increasingly developing from the west. Visibility mostly very good.
<b>Temperature (at 600m)</b>	10 to 13C.
<b>And in the valleys</b>	12C at dawn, rising to 19C afternoon.

## Peak District - Looking Ahead

	Thursday 3 July	Friday 4 July
<b>How windy? (On the summits)</b>	Southwesterly 10 to 20mph, tending to strengthen.	Southwesterly 25 to 30mph, speeds likely increasing during day, risk later 35-40mph exposed high tops.
<b>Effect of wind on you?</b>	<b>Fairly small</b>	<b>Increasingly strenuous walking conditions over exposed terrain. Marked wind chill.</b>
<b>How wet?</b> (Precipitation and its impact)	<b>Rain unlikely</b>	<b>Little or no rain</b> Possibly a drizzly shower western hills, but most of the day likely dry. Toward dusk, increasing risk of rain developing from west.
<b>Cloud on the hills?</b>	<b>None expected</b>	<b>Mostly above hills</b>  Some cloud banks may graze higher western moors in the morning, lifting above tops until late evening.
<b>Chance of cloud free summits?</b>	<b>Above 90%</b>	<b>80%</b>
<b>Sunshine?</b> Air clarity (below cloud)	Patchwork of cloud and sun. Visibility excellent.	Fairly cloudy, occasional sun best in east. Visibility very good.
<b>Temperature (at 600m)</b>	10C rising to 14C.	10C rising to 14C. Feeling like 3 to 6C in the wind.
<b>And in the valleys</b>	10C at dawn, rising to 20C afternoon.	12C at dawn, rising to 20C afternoon.

## Planning Outlook

### All mountain areas of Britain from Thursday, 3 July, 2025

By Thursday, west to southwesterly winds increase for Scotland, with frequent showery rain and low cloud returning into the Highlands from the west. Friday brings heavier rain to western Scotland and gales over higher terrain for Scotland and possibly northern England, rain extending further south with time. The weekend looks unsettled with low pressure bringing heavy showery rain widely, risk isolated thunder. Next week maintains a mixed westerly regime with greatest risk of rain toward northwest Scotland, drier and warmer further south and east.
