

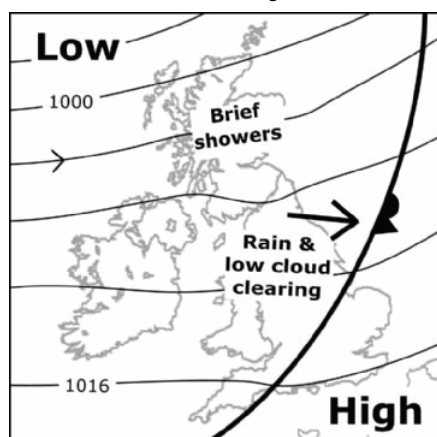
Peak District

General Summary for Thursday, 7 August, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 7 August, 2025

Gale-force winds across higher mountains in Scotland all day; windy on tops for England and Wales, strongest in morning. Early rain clears southeastwards, leaving scattered showery rain but many places often dry. Cloud bases generally rising, though often covering west coastal mountains in Scotland.

Headline for Peak District

Windy, particularly morning. Early rain fading, cloud lifting.

Detailed Forecast for Thursday, 7 August, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	West-southwesterly 30-35mph from dawn into morning, easing to 20-25mph afternoon.
Effect of wind on you?	From dawn, arduous walking on higher areas and considerable wind chill; easing though feeling breezy where exposed.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain in morning clearing Rain on and off early to mid morning, clearing from the northwest to leave rare brief showers.
Cloud on the hills?	Morning low cloud clearing Fog from 500m up fairly extensive through morning with patches down to lower areas in west. Will improve markedly through middle of day, clearing the hills.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Rising to 90% by middle of day
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Dull and misty through morning; sun increasingly breaking out afternoon. Becoming very good visibility; some haze.
Temperature (at 600m)	13 to 15C, warmest south. Will feel like 5C directly in the wind in morning.
And in the valleys	12C from dawn, rising to 18 to 20C in the afternoon.

All mountain areas of Britain from Friday, 8 August, 2025

A mixed southwesterly weather pattern prevails. Often windy, especially Scotland. Fronts coming in from the Atlantic bringing periods of rain most frequently in west and northwest Scotland - wettest here around Friday night into early Saturday. Small amounts of rain reaching eastern Scotland, more often dry. Patchier and less frequent rain for western England and Wales - higher pressure building for periods to give drier and warmer weather here. Low cloud often shrouding western tops, sometimes to lower elevations near coasts, higher cloud bases eastwards with better breaks.

Forecasts are issued daily by 16:30 and are kept under review and amended as necessary. However, expected conditions can still change after issue. © Copyright Mountain Weather Information Service, 2025.
