




The southernmost Pennines, covering the entire Peak District National Park, also extending north to hills accessed from Hebden Bridge, and including the hills immediately north of Manchester.

General Summary for Saturday, 23 August, 2025



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 23 August, 2025

Cloudy skies for many places, varied areas of low cloud on some hill slopes in the morning, largely lifting above the tops, but may continue to cap higher western mountains in Scotland, with a little rain occasionally. An odd shower in north Wales in afternoon. Winds generally light.

Headline for Peak District

Largely dry, cloud mostly above hills; light winds.

Detailed Forecast for Saturday, 23 August, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Variable direction 5 to 10mph.	
Effect of wind on you?	Negligible	
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain unlikely Chance an odd patch of drizzle around early low cloud.	
Cloud on the hills?	Risk early low cloud, clearing	
	Patchy cloud or mist around some slopes early morning; cloud lifting generally above the hills during morning.	
Chance of cloud free summits?	70% rising above 90%	
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Occasional sun and mostly thin high cloud. May start misty, visibility becoming excellent.	
Temperature (at 600m)	10C from dawn. Rising to 16C afternoon.	
And in the valleys	8C or locally cooler in some sheltered spots at dawn, rising to 20 to 22C afternoon.

How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Southerly or variable 10 to 15mph. Small	Southerly, strengthening, 15-25mph, reaching 30mph on exposed high tops and near some edges. Starting fairly small, but increasingly blustery, in places affecting comfortable walking where exposed.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain not expected	Rain not expected until night Very likely dry all day. Into night, risk of rain developing from the southwest.
Cloud on the hills?	Patchy cloud clearing Some cloud banks may cover western hills in the morning, but generally lifting above hills.	None expected
Chance of cloud free summits?	90%	Above 90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Sun and some high cloud. Visibility good, but slight haze.	Sunshine and some high cloud moving in. Visibility good, possible slight haze.
Temperature (at 600m)	11C from dawn, rising to 17C afternoon.	14C rising to 18C. In the wind feeling like 5 to 10C.
And in the valleys	9C at dawn, locally cooler in some spots if skies clear. Reaching 22C by afternoon.	13C at dawn, rising to 24C afternoon.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Sunday, 24 August, 2025

High pressure drifts slowly east, whilst low pressure over the Atlantic encroaches nearer in the early part of the new week. Southeasterly winds increasing Sunday-Monday, soonest for western regions, becoming much windier by Monday in west, then more widely with time. Areas of rain and showery bursts increasingly widespread as the week progresses as low pressure then rotates slowly over Britain - day-to-day detail becomes very uncertain. Warmer and more humid for a time, then cooler later in week.

Forecast issued at 16:30 on Friday, 22 August, 2025
