




The southernmost Pennines, covering the entire Peak District National Park, also extending north to hills accessed from Hebden Bridge, and including the hills immediately north of Manchester.

General Summary for Monday, 8 September, 2025



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 8 September, 2025

Strong winds and scattered showers western Scotland; clearer east with only patchy upland cloud. Showers in England, risk more concentrated rain over Lakeland and west Pennines for periods with heavy bursts. Little cloud on Pennines. Blustery in Wales with frequent showers, risk local hail/thunder.

Headline for Peak District

Scattered showers, risk locally heavy; breezy in exposure

Detailed Forecast for Monday, 8 September, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Southwesterly 15-25mph. May trend towards lower speeds for a few hours in the afternoon.	
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small though noticeably blustery on exposed edges. Noticeably chilly in exposure.	
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Scattered showers, intermittently dry Scattered showery rain spreading from the southwest, at times more frequent with a risk of heavy/thundery bursts. May be dry for several hours between showery spells.	
Cloud on the hills?	Little if any Patchy cloud at various heights at dawn, largely lifting and breaking off the summits fairly soon after sunrise. Odd patches may briefly return in showers, through short lived.	
Chance of cloud free summits?	90%	
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Fairly extensive sunshine, becoming patchy as afternoon showers build. Visibility very good.	
Temperature (at 600m)	9C rising to 12 or 13C. Feeling like 5 to 7C where exposed to direct wind.	
And in the valleys	9C at dawn, rising to 17C afternoon.

How windy? (On the summits)	Southerly 15-20mph. Strengthening after into and overnight towards 25-30mph.	Southerly 25-35mph. May shift SW'ly late in the day.
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small during daylight.	Comfort of walking affected, stability challenged at times in exposure. Feeling cool.
How wet?	Little or no rain	Afternoon showery rain
(Precipitation and its impact)	Small chance of local afternoon showers - if any, amounting to little.	Odd spots of rain here and there in the morning. Risk of showery rain on-and-off increases through afternoon with local heavy bursts, through
Cloud on the hills?	Soon cloud-free	Often clear early, deteriorating with rain
	From dawn, patchy mist in sheltered valleys with odd fog patches at higher elevations. Fog will break and lift for cloud-free moors.	Many hills clear for several hours in the morning - variable banks may come and go over high ground. Patches rising in number and extent as rain arrives, increasingly extensive with only occasional breaks.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Rising to above 90%	70%, lowering to 30%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Mostly sunny through morning, fair weather cloud building afternoon. Very good visibility.	Some glimpses of sun in the morning soon shrouded by high cloud. Good visibility, deteriorating during periods of rain; some haze east.
Temperature (at 600m)	9C rising to 14C.	10C rising to 12C. Feeling just above freezing in strongest wind.
And in the valleys	8C from dawn, rising to 18C.	9 or 10C from dawn, rising to 16C.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 9 September, 2025

Low pressure over the north Atlantic dominates the weather pattern over the next 10 days, maintaining unsettled conditions. West to southwesterly winds prevail bringing frequent rain and cloud to western areas, regularly becoming more widespread as weather features come and go. Early indications suggest a deeper area of low pressure late weekend and early next week will bring widespread gales, possibly severe on highest terrain.

Tending to improve after mid-month with longer periods of dry weather, but a persistent southwesterly regime will continue to draw unsettled spells of weather into Britain, notably in the north.
