

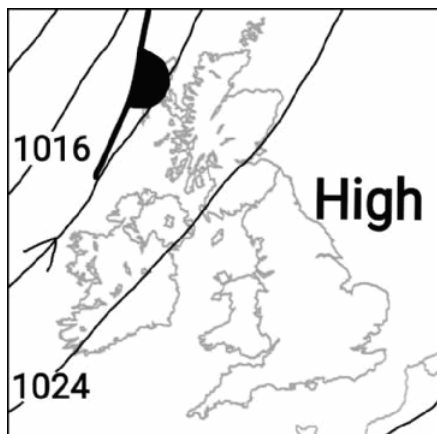
Peak District

General Summary for Monday, 29 September, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 29 September, 2025

Scotland: Southwesterly winds with a warm front bringing cloud and patchy rain into afternoon for western hills. Eastern hills substantially clear with morning sunshine.

England/Wales: Sunshine giving way to veil of cloud, with will lower onto higher western tops with local drizzle. Dry elsewhere.

Headline for Peak District

Sunny morning. Clouding over afternoon. Light winds, hills clear.

| Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud) | Morning sunshine, then a veil of high cloud gradually thickens from the west. Good visibility, though morning haze. |
| Temperature (at 600m) | 9 or 10C. |
| And in the valleys | 6C from dawn, rising to 14C. |

| Effect of wind on you? | Small | Mostly small |
| How wet? (Precipitation and its impact) | Rain unlikely Pockets of drizzle may drift onto some hills in Lancashire, but most or all Peak District NP likely dry. | A little rain, mainly morning. A warm front will bring a spell of persistent rain in the morning, mainly just light to moderate in intensity. In the afternoon, likely to become mostly dry. |
| Cloud on the hills? | Lifting above many hills Some low cloud mainly western areas in the morning, plus mist patches some valleys elsewhere. All likely to lift and clear to leave cloud above most or all hills. | Covering tops for a time in rain Hills will likely be topped in some fog during rain, which will mostly occur in the morning. Come the afternoon, hills will be frequently clear. |
| Chance of cloud free summits? | 70% | 60% |
| Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud) | Largely cloudy, some sun occasionally breaking through mainly east. Visibility mostly good. | A little weak sun coming through at times as the cloud layer thins. Visibility often very good away from rain. |
| Temperature (at 600m) | 9C rising to 12C afternoon. | 12C |
| And in the valleys | 8C at dawn, locally cooler in sheltered spots. Rising to 17C afternoon. | Max temperature 17C |

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 30 September, 2025

Next week the UK is situated under a boundary between high and low pressure with a trend towards more settled conditions in the south, unsettled in the north. Northwest England and west Scotland could be rather wet with a southwesterly wind pushing cloud and spells of rain onto western hills. Several more organized frontal systems are likely to pass into eastern Scotland as well. Generally dry for the Pennines and Wales, though cloud and occasionally drizzly rain will impact western areas, notably Lakeland and Snowdonia. Sun breaks likely in England but short-lived. First indications of more widely unsettled weather into next weekend as a deeper area of low pressure passes north, though confidence remains low regarding timing and strength.
