

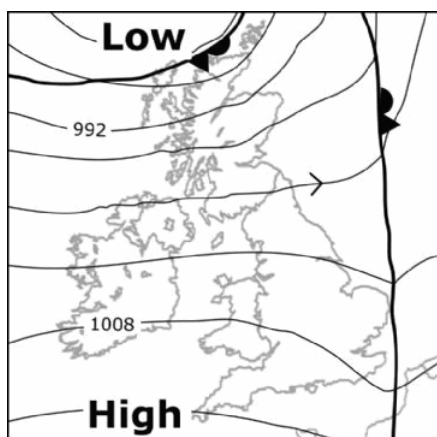
Peak District

General Summary for Sunday, 2 November, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 2 November, 2025

Showery westerly winds, reaching gale force Scottish Highlands where cold enough for snow on higher tops. The rain will be almost constant NW Highlands, whilst from southern Scotland southward, showers will become well scattered. Least windy south Wales.

Headline for Peak District

Blustery higher slopes. Showers. Cold.

Detailed Forecast for Sunday, 2 November, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Westerly 25 to 30mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Where exposed, marked wind chill and walking will be impeded.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Substantially dry after morning showers Showers, perhaps frequent on some hills for an hour or two morning. Frequently or perhaps completely dry afternoon.
Cloud on the hills?	Likely clear by midday Cloud likely to clear higher slopes after dawn, but by late morning only a few patches covering higher tops.
Chance of cloud free summits?	90% by midday
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Intermittently sunshine by late morning. Very good visibility, but slight haze.
Temperature (at 600m)	5C. Will feel as cold as minus 5C directly in the wind.
And in the valleys	5C at dawn, rising to 10C.

Peak District - Looking Ahead

	Monday 3 November	Tuesday 4 November
How windy? (On the summits)	Southwesterly 40mph.	South to southwesterly 35mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Arduous to difficult conditions on higher areas and significant wind chill.	Continued arduous walking where exposed on higher areas, where wind chill will be considerable.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain on and off, at times more frequent Rain on and off, more patchy eastern areas. Most frequent rain near and north of the M62 where may merge into longer periods.	Frequent rain. Rain on and off most or all day.
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive Higher areas frequently or persistently cloud covered; typical cloud base 300m, although nearer 400m on more eastern areas.	Very extensive. Widely persistent fog above 300 or 400m.
Chance of cloud free summits?	10%	20%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Frequent dull and visibility poor in rain.	Little if any sun: often dull and misty, particularly more western areas.
Temperature (at 600m) And in the valleys	10C. Feeling below freezing in exposure to wind. 10C from dawn rising to 14C.	9C. Will feel near freezing point directly in the wind. Around 13C.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Monday, 3 November, 2025

A series of deep Atlantic lows and associated fronts will continue to cross Britain over the next week to ten days . Frequently windy, and high rainfall, particularly on western mountains (rain at some stage almost daily) and cloud will frequently cover higher areas. Only rarely cold enough for snow higher mountains in Scotland.
