




The southernmost Pennines, covering the entire Peak District National Park, also extending north to hills accessed from Hebden Bridge, and including the hills immediately north of Manchester.

General Summary for Monday, 3 November, 2025



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 3 November, 2025

Gale to, in places, severe gale force south-westerlies will drive in very extensive low cloud across the hills and rainfall. The rain will be near constant across western mountains, and on and off across eastern areas. Significant wind chill.

Headline for Peak District

Strong to gale force south-westerly winds with rain on and off and extensive hill fog.

Detailed Forecast for Monday, 3 November, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Southwesterly 40-45mph.		
Effect of wind on you?	Arduous to difficult conditions on higher areas and significant wind chill.		
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain on and off, at times more frequent Rain on and off, more patchy eastern areas. Most frequent rain near and north of the M62 where may merge into longer periods.		
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive Higher areas frequently or persistently cloud covered; typical cloud base 300m, although nearer 400m on more eastern areas.		
Chance of cloud free summits?	10%		
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Frequent dull and visibility poor in rain.		
Temperature (at 600m)	10C. Feeling below freezing in exposure to wind.		
And in the valleys	10C from dawn rising to 14C.		

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Peak District - Looking Ahead

	Tuesday 4 November	Wednesday 5 November
How windy? (On the summits)	South to southwesterly 35mph.	Southerly 30mph in the morning, easing into afternoon to 20mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Continued arduous walking where exposed on higher areas, where wind chill will be considerable.	Be prepared for very blustery conditions in the morning with considerable wind chill. Easing into afternoon.
How wet?	Frequent rain.	Rain on and off
(Precipitation and its impact)	Rain on and off most or all day.	Rain and drizzle through the day. May ease off for a few hours around the middle of the day.
Cloud on the hills?	Very extensive.	Extensive
	Widely persistent fog above 300 or 400m.	Be prepared for extensive low cloud from mid to upper slopes much of the day.
Chance of cloud free summits?	20%	30%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Little if any sun: often dull and misty, particularly more western areas.	Overcast.
		Visibility sometimes poor due to rain.
Temperature (at 600m)	9C. Will feel near freezing point directly in the wind.	11C
And in the valleys	Around 13C.	Max temperature up to 15C

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 4 November, 2025

Remaining very unsettled with as a series of deep Atlantic lows, and their associated fronts, continue to cross Britain over the next week to ten days. Frequently windy, with high rainfall, particularly on western mountains (rain at some stage almost daily) and cloud will frequently cover higher areas. Only rarely cold enough for snow higher mountains in Scotland.
