

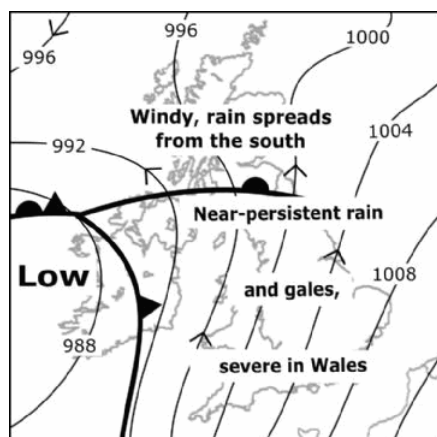
Peak District

General Summary for Tuesday, 11 November, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 11 November, 2025

Rain from dawn in Wales soon spreads widely into England and southern Scotland, setting in for several hours; nearly constant all day for Lakeland and Galloway hills. Widespread gales as well, severe in Wales. A drier start for Scottish Highlands, though rain will spread from the south afternoon with strengthening wind.

Headline for Peak District

Often raining with gale-force winds

Detailed Forecast for Tuesday, 11 November, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Southerly, strengthening rapidly from before dawn to 35 to 45mph in morning, reaching a gusty 50mph at times high tops, risk higher speeds around and after dark.
Effect of wind on you?	Soon arduous walking conditions, difficult in places on higher exposed terrain; beware strong, destabilising gusts near edges.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Often raining, at times persistent Steady rain sets in from dawn for several hours, breaking into some patchy rain and drizzle, especially in western areas, some further pulses of rain at times. Returning broadly and heavy again for several hours into nighttime.
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive higher areas Shrouding hills widely above 500-600m, at times lower in rain especially more west and southwestern areas. Ragged patches are likely at various heights.
Chance of cloud free summits?	20%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Overcast and dull, murky in rain. Visibility locally improves during breaks in the rain.
Temperature (at 600m)	6C rising soon after dawn to 8C, reaching 10C afternoon, staying elevated for several hours into nighttime; only small fall with height. Feeling below freezing directly in wind.
And in the valleys	8C at dawn, rising to 12C afternoon, staying mild with little change into evening and night.

Peak District - Looking Ahead

	Wednesday 12 November	Thursday 13 November
How windy? (On the summits)	Southwesterly 20mph, to at times 30mph, tending to ease with time.	Detail uncertain: southwesterly 20-30mph, though likely variable with lower speeds for a time. Later, gusty NE'ly 25-35mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Blustery over hills around dawn, improving to be smaller middle of day, risk deteriorating to dusk onward.	Highly variable: may be fairly small for periods, though sudden deterioration of conditions is possible.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Briefly drier, risk heavy rain later Wet underfoot following overnight rain, which leaves patchy rain or drizzle into the morning, then becomes more persistent again from the south with time, risk heavier rain setting in again afternoon-evening.	Showery rain, may ease Often raining from dawn, gradually breaking into more showery rain through morning. May trend towards drier weather later though confidence is low.
Cloud on the hills?	Fairly extensive over hills Banks of cloud from lower elevations upward in the morning, may linger across many moors all day, local high breaks for a time, but filling in again widely in rain.	Fairly extensive over summits, at times lower Highest moors likely in fog most or all day. Bases variable, may lift towards the high moors for periods, through intermittently lowering during periods of rain.
Chance of cloud free summits?	20%	30%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Largely cloudy, any sun weak and brief. Misty areas may linger, occasionally good visibility locally.	A few glimpses of sunshine though often overcast. Variable visibility: poor in rain, though good during dry periods.
Temperature (at 600m)	9 or 10C.	10C, lowering to 4C, though confidence is low in timing and magnitude of change.
And in the valleys	Little change around 11 or 12C night and day.	10C from dawn, lowering to 6C, though significant uncertainty of timing and magnitude of change.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 12 November, 2025

Periods of heavy rain for many over several day; further flooding for Wales, the Lakes and southwest Scotland. Cooler than recently in Scotland with freezing levels lowering to most high terrain, snow showers falling on high terrain from the north; remaining generally mild England and Wales by day and night.

Later in the week and into the weekend, high pressure draws colder air into Scotland and progressively further south into England and Wales over the weekend. Strong easterlies are likely over England and Wales and conditions will be largely dry with some clear hills and sunny bursts; overnight frosts likely widespread in Scotland. The weather regime the following week is uncertain but first indications suggest more unsettled weather.
