




The southernmost Pennines, covering the entire Peak District National Park, also extending north to hills accessed from Hebden Bridge, and including the hills immediately north of Manchester.

General Summary for Friday, 21 November, 2025



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 21 November, 2025

Terrain widely frozen after hard frost; snow cover across much upland terrain, or more substantial to lower slopes northern Highlands. A front moves into Scotland, snow then rain in west, cloud lowering. Elsewhere dry, sunshine weakening. Wind strengthening to gale force Scottish mountains.

Headline for Peak District

Light wind middle of day. Dry with sunshine.

Detailed Forecast for Friday, 21 November, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	North-northwest turning westerly, 15 to 20mph at first, dropping to 10mph or less for a few hours, tending to increase again toward dusk, into evening-night eventually to southwesterly 30mph.		
Effect of wind on you?	Mostly small during daytime, starting to deteriorate after dark.		
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Dry until well into night A dusting of snow on some higher terrain, mainly northern Peak District. Dry all day, evening and well into night. Later in night, rain and some hill snow for a time develops from west.		
Cloud on the hills?	None expected		
Chance of cloud free summits?	Above 90%		
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Sunshine and thin high cloud, tending to thicken from west later. Visibility excellent, possible mist or haze in some valleys.		
Temperature (at 600m)	-1C, slight rise to around 0C afternoon, then +2C into night.		
And in the valleys	Well below freezing around dawn, slow rise to 2 or 3C afternoon, but then little change or slight rise further into night.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Saturday, 22 November, 2025

Changes into the weekend as less cold Atlantic air moves in, but higher mountain terrain at least in Scotland staying frozen with snow cover. A complex area of low pressure circulates over Britain through the weekend, retreating to leave briefly northeasterly winds by Monday; areas of rain and some upland snow, mainly Scotland and high tops in northern England. Winds will vary markedly, some lulls, but risk periods of gales. A brief ridge of high pressure gives a lull by Tuesday, then a shift to milder southwesterlies is likely to bring spells of rain and some thawing to higher levels.
