

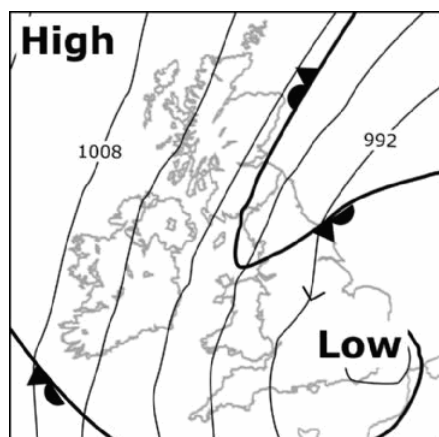
Peak District

General Summary for Monday, 24 November, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 24 November, 2025

Turning cold from north and extensively windy behind an area of low pressure centred over SE England. Snow and hail showers will affect N & E Scotland, whilst further south patchy rain (sleet highest summits), but total rainfall small.

Headline for Peak District

Showers; sometimes frequent upland wind near gale.

Detailed Forecast for Monday, 24 November, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Northerly, 35mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Will impede ease of walking, and at times in gusty conditions, balance may be tricky and wind chill considerable.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Occasional rain A few bursts of showery rain, most likely more eastern areas.
Cloud on the hills?	Mostly or all clearing Nearly all hills are likely to clear, although in the morning cloud extensively shrouding the hills. Gradually most or all summits clearing.
Chance of cloud free summits?	70% by afternoon
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Occasional sunshine, mainly more western areas. Visibility very good.
Temperature (at 600m)	Around 3C - a marginal drop likely through the day Will feel as cold as minus 8C directly in the wind.
And in the valleys	Will reach 7 or 8C early afternoon.

Peak District - Looking Ahead

	Tuesday 25 November	Wednesday 26 November
How windy? (On the summits)	Northerly 25, perhaps 30mph at first; but easing toward 20mph.	Southwesterly soon 35 to 40mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Considerable buffeting and wind chill after dawn, but will become small through afternoon.	Soon extensively arduous or difficult walking where exposed with sudden gusts and considerable wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Precipitation very unlikely Small risk of a brief shower.	Rain on and off, mainly afternoon Intermittent rain and drizzle gradually spreading east, most likely later morning or middle of day. Total rain small.
Cloud on the hills?	Very little if any	Higher hills gradually filling in with fog Higher slopes initially cloud free. Will deteriorate in rain as across western hills cloud lowers to around 400m, and 500m eastern areas.
Chance of cloud free summits?	80%	Dropping to 20%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Bright sunshine. Excellent visibility.	A few glimpses of weak sunshine lower slopes. Becoming misty in rain.
Temperature (at 600m)	2C	3C rising to 6C. Will feel as cold as minus 6C directly in the wind.
And in the valleys	Will rise to around 6C early afternoon. Frost many valleys morning.	Widespread frost at first, as low as minus 3C; but rising through daylight to around 5 or 6C.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 25 November, 2025

As a series of deep Atlantic lows pass north of or across Britain, rainfall be become high particularly on western mountains together with frequent upland gales and low cloud. In Scotland, temperatures on the Munros will sometimes be below freezing point, but fresh snow transient, whereas elsewhere, snow rare, if any.
