

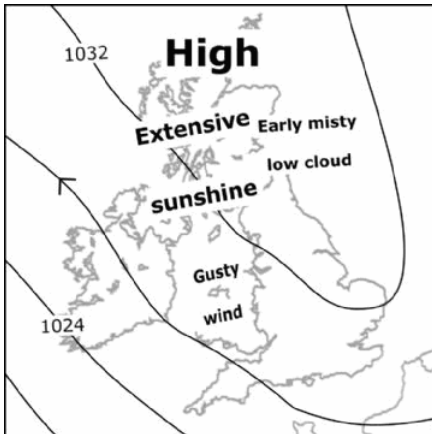
Peak District

General Summary for Thursday, 23 April, 2026



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 23 April, 2026

Gusty easterly winds for England, Wales and southern Scotland, but warmer and less windy overall than recent days. Light winds for much of the Highlands. Some early low-level mist, mostly toward eastern Pennines, but the mountains clear with bright sunshine widely; high UV levels, beware sunburn.

Headline for Peak District

Breezy, gusty. Sunshine, warming up.

Detailed Forecast for Thursday, 23 April, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	East or southeasterly 20 to 25mph, gusty in places around higher moors and edges, tending to ease toward evening.
Effect of wind on you?	Feeling rather blustery and cool over exposed higher terrain, gusts not just on the tops.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	No precipitation expected
Cloud on the hills?	Early cloud banks clearing Patchy cloud from dawn, may take a few hours to clear mostly over eastern moors early morning, but all breaking up.
Chance of cloud free summits?	50% at first, becoming practically certain
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Early cloud particularly in east will thin to give increasing sun. Visibility good, some slight haze.
Temperature (at 600m)	6C rising to 10C afternoon. Feeling close to 0C in the morning if directly in the wind.
And in the valleys	Frost in sheltered valleys at dawn. Rising to 17C afternoon, locally warmer toward the west.

How windy? (On the summits)	East to southeasterly 10-15mph.	Variable direction mostly 10mph or less.
Effect of wind on you?	Small.	Negligible.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	No rain expected	No rain expected
Cloud on the hills?	Some early low fog, otherwise clear Fog patches in the valleys from dawn briefly starts lifting upslope after sunrise, but soon dissipates for cloud-free hills.	None expected
Chance of cloud free summits?	Practically certain	Above 90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Extensive sunshine. Very good visibility, slight low-level haze.	Extensive sunshine, some thin high cloud. Visibility good, slight low-level haze.
Temperature (at 600m)	7C rising to 14C. (Hills warmer than valleys at first).	10 to 14C.
And in the valleys	Close to freezing in sheltered valleys at dawn with slight frost. Rising to 19C afternoon, locally warmer in west.	Patchy frost at dawn]valleys and sheltered higher areas. Rising toward 20C afternoon.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Friday, 24 April, 2026**

A generally dry spell of weather continues into the weekend and next week, with mostly light winds and pleasantly warm temperatures, reaching 10C+ on many tops. Valleys and some sheltered higher areas will see some frosty dawns but by the afternoons many valleys will warm up toward 20C. Briefly cooler air drifts back into northeastern areas later Saturday. Strong April sunshine widely across the mountains, beware risk of sunburn. Misty starts in some valleys.
